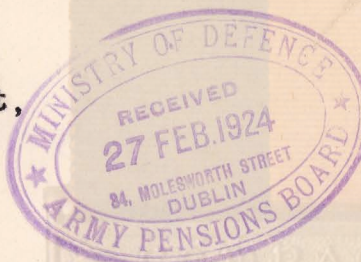

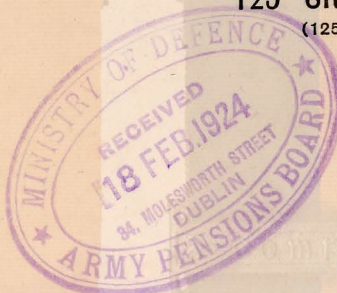

Reference your A/3736 of the 16th inst.,
Deceased, Jeremiah Hurley, held the rank of
Battalion Commandant, 4th Battalion, 1st
Cork Brigade.

He was shot dead on the 28th May 1921 at
Ballyedmund, Midleton, Co. Cork. At this
time he was on the run, and was proceeding along
the public road at Ballyedmund, Midleton, where
he was to rejoin his Column. As he turned
a corner of the road he met a Patrol of Crown
Forces who called on him to "Halt". Hurley was
armed with "A Peter the Painter" at the time -
a low fence bounded the road - he jumped over
the fence and endeavoured to make his escape.
He was fired on by Crown Forces, and returned
the fire, continuing to run across the field.
When Hurley had got about 300 yards across the
field he was shot dead. A little later some
members of His Column found the body and had
it buried in the Republican Plot at Midleton.

Hurley's death was in no way due to
negligence or misconduct on his part. Payment
of claim is strongly recommended.

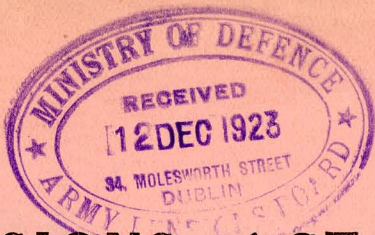
