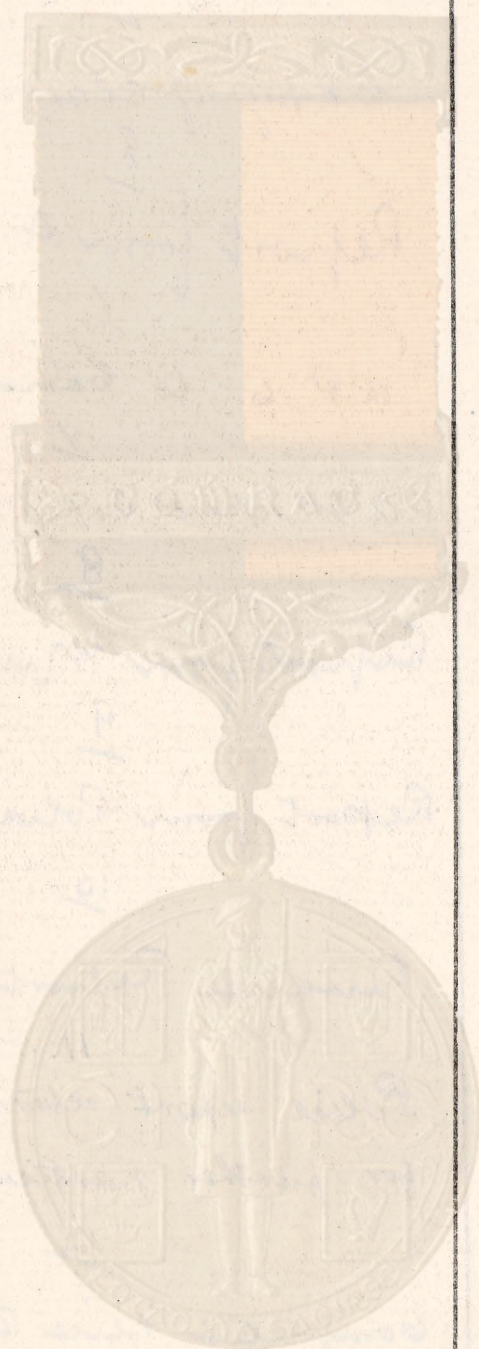
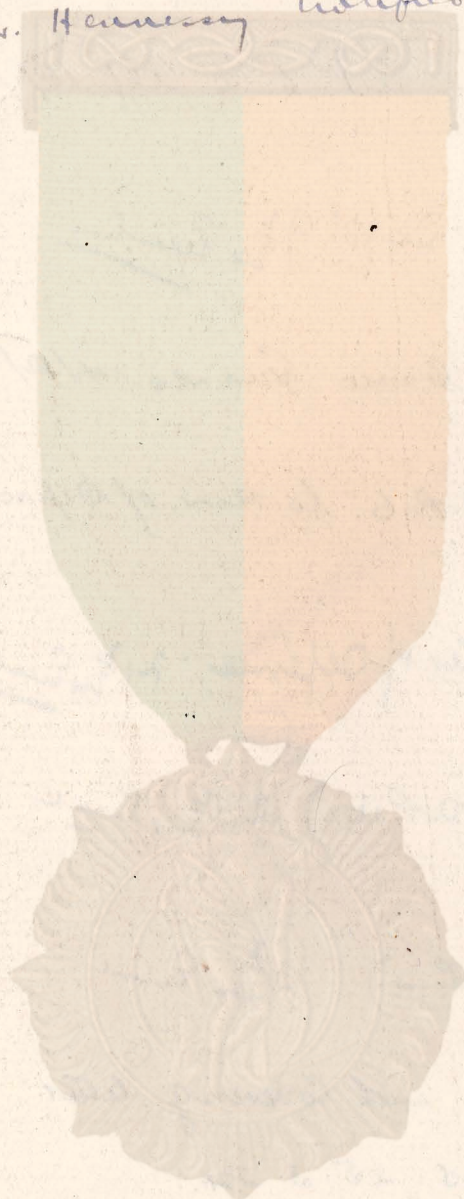

Maurice Moore (1/D/84)

The records in respect of Maurice Moore, formerly of Ticknock, Cobh, Co. Cork show that he served in 'A' Coy., 4th Battalion, Cork No. 1 Brigade of the Irish Volunteers and was executed on 20th April 1921 in Cork Barracks.

His father, Michael Moore applied in 1923 for a Dependant's Allowance or Gratuity under the Army Pensions Act, 1923. He was awarded a Gratuity of £60.00 in June, 1924 (payable in monthly instalments of £10.00).

Following representations from M.J. Hennessy T.D. on behalf of Michael Moore, the case was re-considered by the Army Pensions Board and the award was increased from £60.00 to £100.00.

John Moore (presumably his brother in America) applied in 1950 for a Service Medal on behalf of Maurice Moore. The Service (1917-1921) Medal with bar was awarded posthumously in April, 1952 and was issued to John Moore on 5th April, 1952. Posthumously awarded medals were numbered and this was Medal number 1000.

Enclosed are copies of the following documents from the late Maurice Moore's file :-

1. Application (AP 6) of Michael Moore dated 29th November, 1923 for an Allowance or Gratuity under the Army Pensions Act, 1923.
2. Letter from Office of Adjutant General dated 5th February, 1924 and attached report from Southern Command Headquarters, Cork, dated 1st February, 1924.
3. Certificate of Assessment-Gratuity of £60 recommended by the Army Pensions Board.

6. Application from John Moore for Service Medal, received on 27th February, 1950.

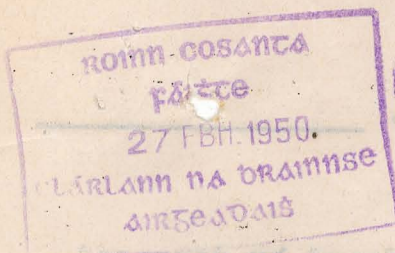

I beg to state that I have made inquiries and personally interrogated the applicant Michael Moore with reference to the attached paper. As a result of the aforementioned inquiries I learn that the applicant at the time of the deceased man's death, was receiving a pension from the British Naval Authorities, amounting to twenty Pounds per year. For three years prior to his son's death, the applicant had no regular employment, and he depended on chance labour. In this case the applicant is father to deceased, and he is sixty-two years of age. He is suffering from nerves and he is incapacitated through general debility. I definitely state that the applicant was partially dependant on the deceased at and prior to the time of his death.

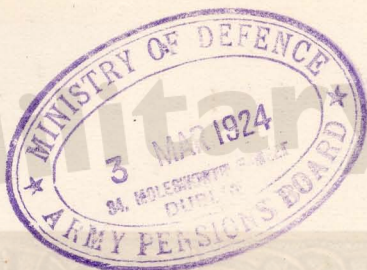

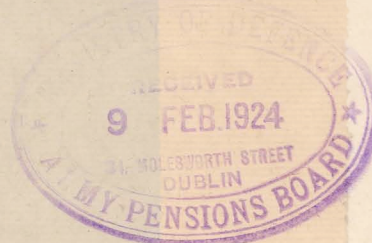
