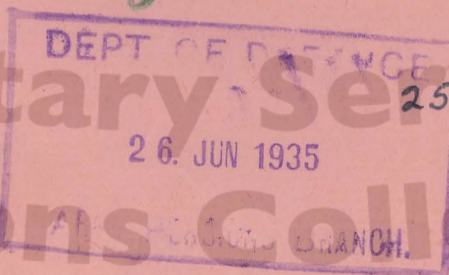

With reference to Mr. Doolin's minute of the 11th April last, Ref. S.82/10/27, relative to the proposal to grant a gratuity of £75 under Section 8 of the Army Pensions Act, 1923, to Mrs. Ellen Maher (Quinlan), Knocklara, Knocklong, Co. Dimerick, in respect of the death of her son, Patrick Maher, who was executed in Mountjoy Prison, on the 7th June, 1921, I am directed by the President and Acting Minister for Defence to submit for the consideration of the Minister for Finance, the attached memorandum of the case prepared by the Secretary.

The Minister is of opinion that having regard to the evidence contained in the memorandum, Maher must be regarded as having been a member of the Volunteers at the time of his death, and he has already given a certificate to this effect under Section 8(1) of the Act. I am directed, accordingly, to request that sanction may be given to the payment of the gratuity of £75 to Mrs. Maher, as already recommended.

MEMORANDUM

on

the claim of Mrs. Ellen Maher,  
Knocklong, in respect of her  
son, Patrick Maher, executed  
June, 1921, by the British.

On 6.6.24, the Adjutant General informed the Army Pensions Branch that "the rank in the Forces equivalent to that held by deceased in the Irish Volunteers is Private."

On 10/6/24, the Adjutant General informed the Army Pensions Branch that on further enquiries it was found that Maher was not a member of the Volunteers.

On 18/9/24, the woman's claim was in consequence turned down by the Army Pensions Branch.

In January, 1926, the Army Pensions Branch received a letter from Edward O'Brien, a well known member of the East Limerick Brigade, and one of the actual participants in the Knocklong attack, to the following effect:-

"As one of the party of Volunteers who took part in the Knocklong rescue in May, 1919, I wish to protest..... There is not the slightest doubt but Maher was Volunteer as was evidenced by the statement signed by himself and Foley on the morning of their execution. I know that the two executed men were very active in their respective Companies and poor Maher especially could ill afford any time (though he gave it ungrudgingly) as he was the sole earner for the household."

Two letters were received from Patrick O'Donnell, O.C., Cush Company of the Volunteers, Kilfinane, in December, 1925, and December, 1926, stating:-

"I as Captain of the Cush Company since 1917 certify that Patrick Maher was an active member of that Company from that date until the time of his arrest. I can give several other names of men who served with him. Patrick Mahon was a Volunteer since our Company started and that was in December, 1915."

On February 8th, 1926, an official of the Exchequer and Audit Department wrote to Mr. Nicholls, Private Secretary to the Minister for Defence, stating:-

" I am conversant with all the facts connected with this case.....Maher before his arrest in September, 1919, drilled with the Cush Company under Captain P. O'Donnell. That Company went Irregular after the Truce. Both Maher and Foley took part in two Hunger Strikes in Belfast and Mountjoy Jails. Maher knew every member of the Knocklong rescue party but did not divulge information under pressure. I spent some hours with both men on the eve of the executions. Maher told me of the loss he would be to his mother and requested me to do all I could to see that poverty would not add to her sufferings. The cottage was

/ his

his, and at the time of his arrest he was practically the sole support of his mother and stepsister."

In February, 1926, the Adjutant General further investigated the matter, and on the 27th February, 1926, the Director of Intelligence reported that "Maher, although he could not strictly be regarded as a Volunteer, having never taken part in Volunteer activities, was at one period enrolled as a member of Cush Company, East Limerick Brigade. Activities had not developed to any great extent until about the time of Patrick Maher's arrest."

In June, 1926, the Adjutant General sent all the papers to the G.O.C., Southern Command, to ascertain definitely whether or not Maher was a Volunteer, and the G.O.C. reported as follows:-

"I have made personal enquiries and have ascertained that Maher was a member of the Irish Volunteers."

-----

It is quite clear from the evidence that Maher was an Irish Volunteer and that he was killed while performing his duty as such. The original difficulty of verifying his membership arose owing to the fact that Volunteer activities only commenced about the time of his arrest and that his former comrades subsequently became Irregular. The evidence of his O.C., O'Donnell, and of his fellow Volunteers, O'Brien, shows that he was a member of the Irish Volunteers, but it is very important to bear in mind, with regard to his Volunteer activities, that he spent the active Volunteer period in prison and took part in Hunger Strikes with his comrades. He finally proved himself in the manner of his death

It is also clear that Maher was the principal earner of the family and almost the sole effective support of his mother by reason of his constant employment as against the case of the other two sons who were only casually employed as labourers and earned sufficient only to support themselves.

The conditions of the Army Pensions Act as regards Gratuity are therefore fulfilled. It is in fact very much in question, having regard to his mother's almost total dependence on him, whether the conditions of the Act as regards Allowance are not also fulfilled. The conditions referred to are contained in Section 8(1) of the Army Pensions Act, 1923:-

"If the Minister certifies that any person who was killed before the 1st day of April, 1922, was at the time he was killed a member of the Irish Volunteers, and was killed while performing his duty as such member, the like Allowances and Gratuities may be granted to the dependents or partial dependents of such person."

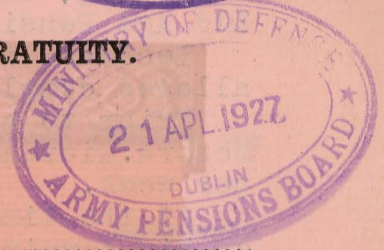

The Civic Guard Report states that the Applicant is close on 70 years of age. She is residing in a labourer's cottage at Knocklara, Knocklong, and is in poor circumstances, dependent on her husband's Old Age Pension and the earnings of two sons.

Deceased was executed in Mountjoy Jail on 7th June, 1921, for alleged complicity in the Knocklong shooting.

Prior to his arrest Maher was employed at the establishment of Messrs. Riordan, Knocklong, as Egg packer and was earning £2.10.0. per week.

At the time of Maher's arrest applicant was almost wholly dependent on his earnings, he was kind to his parents and handed over to them almost all his earnings. His other two brothers were of little assistance being only casual labourers, their wages were uncertain.

The applicant did not enjoy any private income prior to the death of deceased, nor did she hold any regular employment.

She is the mother of the deceased and over 60 years of age.

She has two sons and one daughter - the daughter aged 25 years, and was never employed - the sons 26 and 27 years - casual labourers. The sons (when employed) earn each 15/- per week. They contribute to the upkeep of claimant.

The deceased was an Egg packer at Messrs. Riordan's, Knocklong, and his earnings were £2.10.0. weekly.


