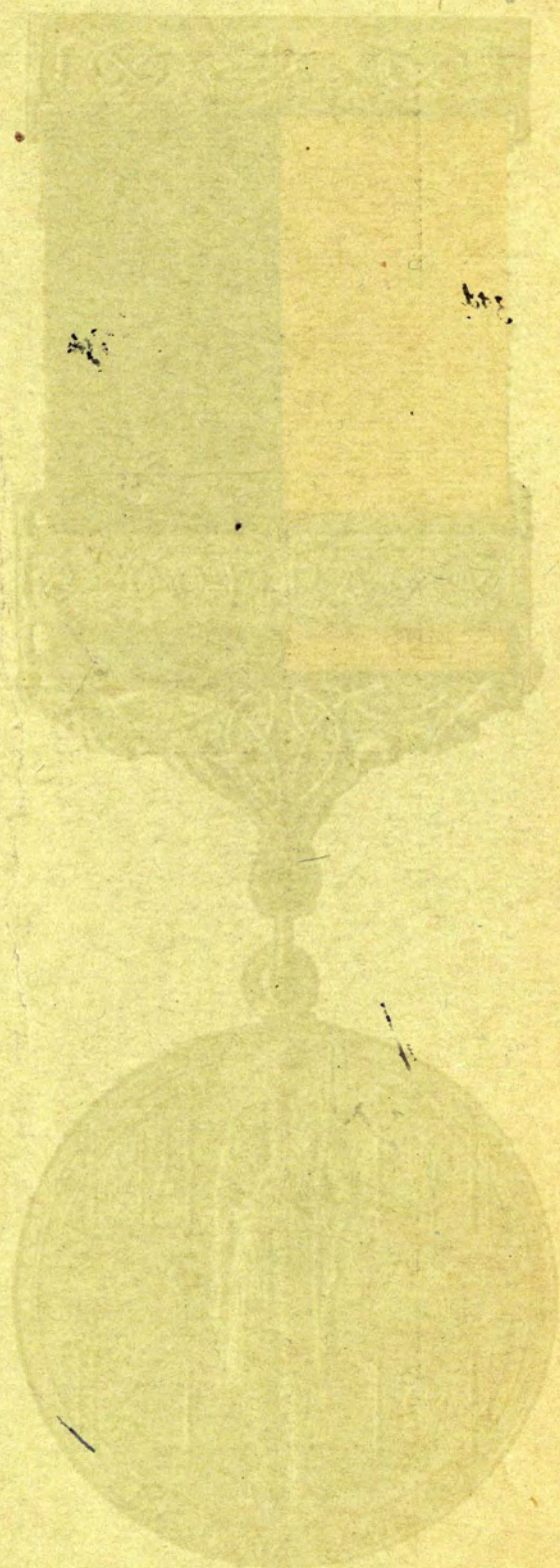

With further reference to your representations on behalf of Mr. James Madigan, West End House, Shanagolden, regarding, inter alia, his application under the Military Service Pensions Acts, An tAire Cosanta desires me to say that Mr. Madigan submitted an application under the Military Service Pensions Act, 1934. The Referee, to whom the application was referred, reported, however, that he was not a person to whom the Act applied, and in the circumstances a certificate which would have rendered him eligible for the award of a pension could not be granted to him. ✓

The findings of the Referee are final and conclusive and, accordingly it is regretted that no action is possible towards having Mr. Madigan's claim reviewed.

Regarding the question of his entitlement to an allowance under the Army Pensions Acts, I am to say that Part II of the Army Pensions Act, 1953 provides for the consideration of a claim from a permanently invalided brother of a deceased person in a case such as this and a form to enable Mr. Madigan to apply for a dependant's allowance in respect of the death of his brother, Timothy, has been issued to him. As soon as this form, duly completed, is returned to the Department, the claim will be dealt with expeditiously. ✓

Enclosed also is a leaflet setting out the conditions governing the award of a special allowance under the Army Pensions Acts. If Mr. Madigan considers he is eligible he should inform this Department accordingly, and request a special allowance application form.

clmt handed over this holding to her eldest living son in 1929. Since then he has supported her + is paying her expenses (2 gns. per week) in Mental Hospital at present.

In 1920 clmt was also managing a holding of similar size etc. for another of her sons who was then a minor + to whom the holding had been willed by clmt's mother-in-law.

clmt's husband died in 1903. Deceased was clmt's eldest son and as such looked after the farms generally, such as gabbing at fairs etc., in the interests of clmt + remainder of family. The second eldest son, to whom the farm was since transferred + who is now supporting clmt was 22 years of age in 1920. clmt is not totally dependent on this son as she has now no means of her own.

In my opinion clmt was only partially

I am desired by Mr. Aiken to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 13th instant relative to a claim under the Army Pensions Act by Mrs. Margaret Madigan formerly of Westend House, Shanagolden, and to state that on looking into the case he feels that you are under some misapprehension in the matter.

On 1st June last (not April as stated in your letter) an application was received from Mr. James Madigan, Westend House, Shanagolden, in respect of the death of his brother Timothy. There was nothing in the form to indicate that Mr. Madigan desired to claim on behalf of his mother, although instructions on this point are contained in the first paragraph of Page 1 of the form. Mr. Madigan's application was referred in the usual manner to the Military Service Registration Board for investigation and report, and was duly reported on by the Board in question. Had this report been referred to the Army Pensions Board, as it normally would have been, the latter Board could only have dealt with an application from Mr. James Madigan and, after investigating his case a report from the Pensions Board would possibly have resulted in Mr. Madigan's claim being rejected, and when a notification accordingly would have issued to him, the position would doubtless have emerged that he really intended to claim on behalf of his mother, who was incapable of managing her own affairs. Had the proceedings gone to this length it will be obvious that Mrs. Madigan's claim would have been considerably delayed. When however the report of the Registration Board was received on the claim of James Madigan, it was observed from a letter received from you last May, that an application had not been received from Mrs. Madigan and that there was the likelihood that James, although he made a prime facie case for himself in the applications submitted by him, had really intended to claim on behalf of his mother. Your enquiries of the 12th instant clarified the position in this respect as indicated in my letter under date in question.

It will be seen therefore that this Department have if anything, gone out of their way to rectify a mistake made by Mr. James Madigan, so as to expedite the investigation of Mrs. Madigan's claim.

An application on A.P. 52 from Mrs. Margaret Madigan, made on her behalf by Mr. James Madigan, has now been received and will be dealt with as expeditiously as possible.

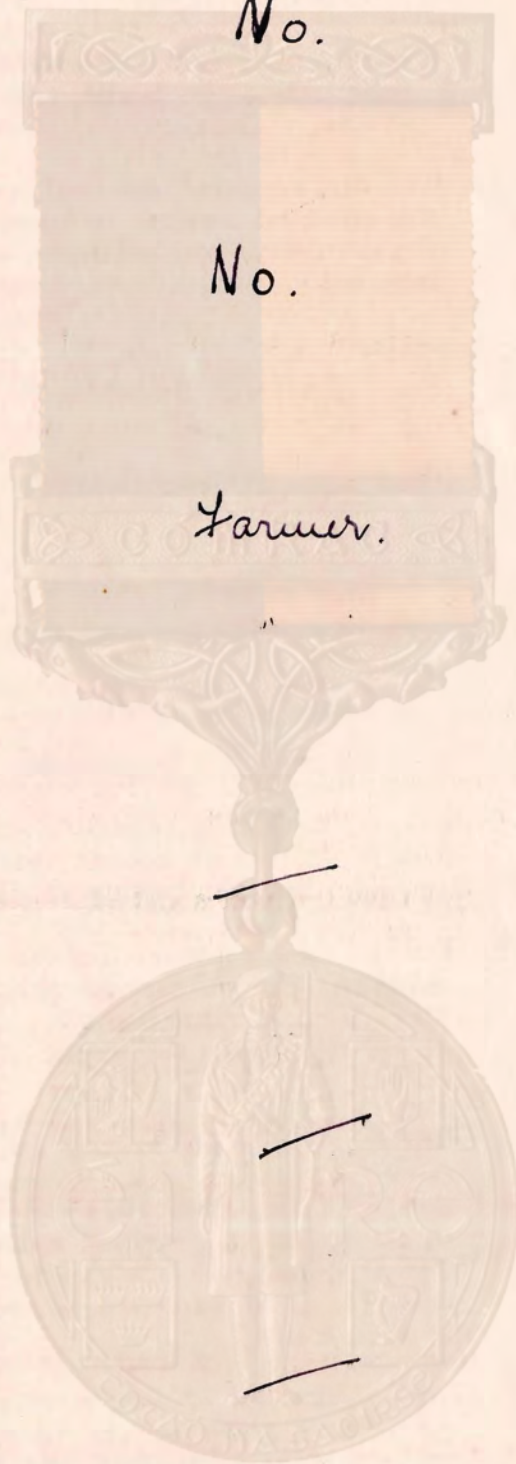
