Mr. Barmody is in receipt of 4/- a week old age pension and, according to an agreement, is supposed to get an annuity of, I think, £10, which, indeed, he never gets, as his married son, from whom he is supposed to get it, has enough to do to support his wife and family on a bad farm of land.

If Mr. Barmody got the full old age pension, the residue of 6/- being in respect of his claim under the Army Acts, he would be quite satisfied.

Kindly reconsider your decision. The applicant is about 79 years of age.

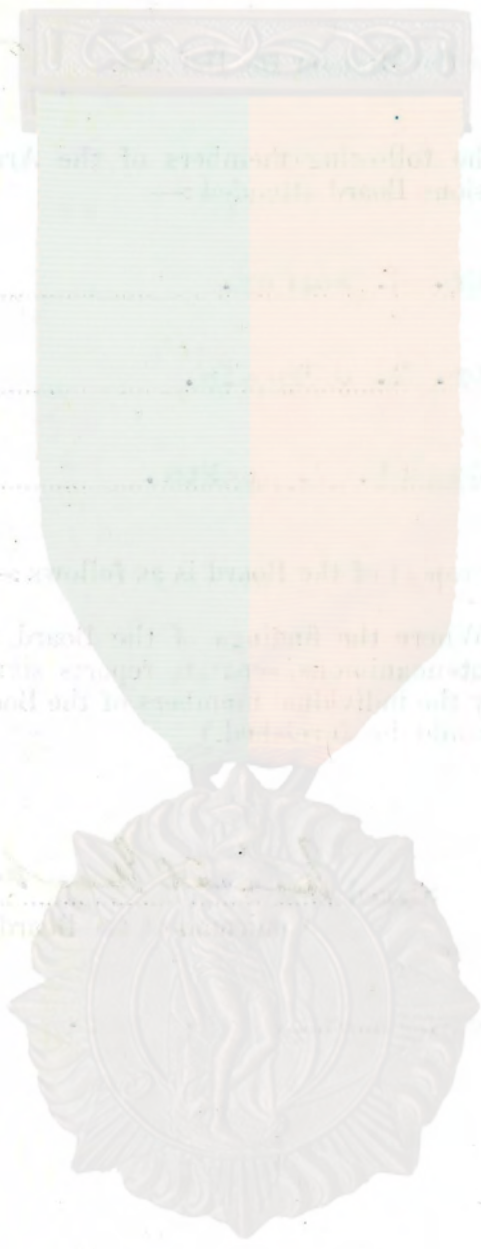

The expression "valuation" means valuation under the Valuation Acts.

The expression "urban area" means any area which is either—

- (a) a county borough, or
- (b) an urban district (not being a county borough) the population of which (as shown by the census of population which is for the time being the latest such census) exceeds seven thousand.

The expression "rural area" means any part of Saorstát Éireann which is not an urban area.

The word "adult" means a person who is aged eighteen years or upwards.

The word "child" means a person under the age of 18 years.

For the purposes of determining the census of population which is the latest such census within the meaning of the definition of the expression "urban area" contained in the immediately preceding sub-rule—

- (a) the census of the population of Saorstát Éireann taken in the year 1936, shall be deemed to have been taken on the date of the passing of this Act, and
- (b) whenever a subsequent census of the population of Saorstát Éireann has been taken, the Minister shall certify the date of the publication of every such census, and every such census shall be deemed to have been taken on the date of publication so certified in respect thereof.

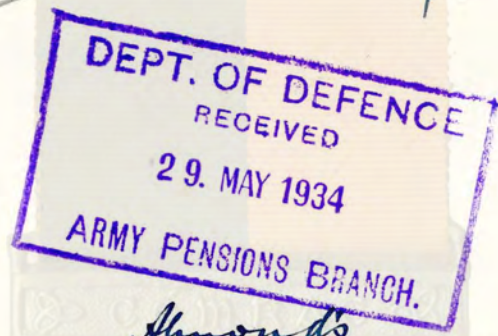

Deceased was to all intents and purposes killed by Crown Forces by reason of the latter's knowledge of his views and activities.

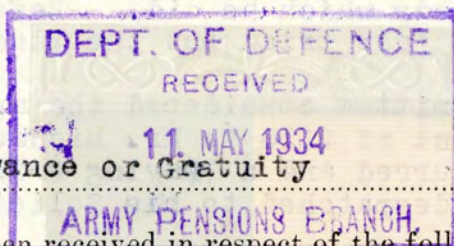

Mr. Michael Carmody of Ahalanna, Newtownsandess, Co. Kerry, applied through his Solicitor, Mr. Henry J. Marshall of Listowel, to the Compensation (Personal Injuries) Committee on the 20th January 1923 for £1,000 compensation in respect of the death of his son Edmond Carmody of Glencullare, Tarbert, Co. Kerry, who was stated to have died on the 22nd November 1920, as a result of gun-shot wounds inflicted on him by British Forces (Black and Tans) at Ballylongford, Co. Kerry, on the 2nd November 1920.

The circumstances in which deceased sustained his injuries were stated as follows:-----

"Deceased was in the village of Ballylongford when the Black and Tans there broke loose, smashed windows, fired shots etc. They met deceased on the road and murdered him. They brought the body into Ballylongford Barracks and next day sent word to Applicant to call for the body which he did. Before being shot Deceased was heard to ask for a fair trial but the Black and Tans only jeered at him."

The Committee considered the application and recommended an ex-gratia payment of £250 to Mr. Michael Carmody. The Minister for Finance concurred and a **Paying Order** for £250 in favour of Mr. Michael Carmody was despatched to his Solicitor on the 2nd February 1924.

No further award is being considered in this case.

The Reference to the Department of Defence papers in the case is A/7622/1501. The Reference to the Department of Justice papers is not stated, but the report of the Deputy Commissioner to the Secretary, Minister of Home Affairs is dated 15th May, 1924.
