Major Operations carried out by Brigade 192I.

There were only 3 Major Operations carried out by the Brigade during 1921. viz:- Cliffden 16.3.21. Screebe, 5.4.21. Mounterowen 25.4.2I.

CLIFDEN. 16.3.2 After failing to contact a Patrol of 8 R.I.C. men who were on patrol in Clifden on the night of the I5th. March. 1921. the Column retired to an unoccupied house about a mile from Clifden. We again approached the town on the night of the I6th. and getting in touch with our Scouts on the outskirts of the town, we learned that a Patrol of four were on the Main St. - 2 R.I.C. & 2 Tans.

After discussion it was decided that 6 men should carry out the attack with small arms, the remainder of the Column beingso disposed that they could bring fire to bear on the R.I.C. Barracks to prevent reinforcements coming out, and to cover the retreat of the attacking party.

The Plan of attach was ;- The Party to walk through Market St. into Main St. 3 abreast; the leading 3 men I5 paces ahead of their comrades; when the leading 3 got past the Patrol, thet were to turn about and get the Patrol between two fires.

This was successfully carried out, the Patrol being met on the Main St. about IOO yards from the Barracks. Only 2 men of the Patrol were met with as the other 2 had - we afterwards learned- gone into a Hotel a few minutes before our arrival.

The 2 Police were shot dead. 2 Webley revolvers & ammunition and I, Lee Enfield rifle and 50 rds. of ammunition were captured. The attackers suffered no casualties.

Intensive fire was opened from the Barracks, as soon as the firing started on the street, this was immediately replied to by the Column, thus preventing any reinforcements coming out, and ensuring the safe return of the attacking party.

SCREEBE. 5.4.2I.

On April 4th. I92I. the A.S.U. visited Screebe in the R. Rosmuck area, to intercept a Patrol of R.I.C., which it was learned visited that area occasionally.

On the morning of the 5th. a local Scout reported that a continuous bad paged through from Maam to Camus. The Column

was immediately mobilised and arrangements made to deal with them on their return.

The position was not by any means ideal for an ambush, but had to be availed of, as the patrol was sighted about 2 miles distant, cycling towards us in extended formation. One many leading, the second about 60 yards behind, and the other three about 100 yards in the rere.

The Column was placed in position, covering about 250 yards of the road, with instructions that fire was not to be opened except on a pre-arranged signal when the enemy were well within the ambush position.

Contrary to instructions, fire was opened by a member of the Column on the leading R.I.C. Sergt. while the three R.I.C. bringing up the rere were still outside the ambush position.

In the ensuing fight, 2 R.I.C. were wounded, - I.in the

ambush and one of the rearguard. Two revolvers & ammunition, & one rifle & ammunition, & 5. cycles were captured. The Column suffered no casualties.

All the above were in the ambush position and took part in the engagement.

MOUNTEROWEN. 23.4, 21.

After the Screebe Ambush information was received that a strong party of military and police were to raid the Maam Valley from Maam to Leenane. On the night of the 6.4.2I. the Column took up position at Padraic O'Maille's house, Mounterowen, and decided to wait for and engage the raiding party.

At 3 a.m. on the 24.4.2I. the Guard Commander reported that what looked like a party of men were observed approaching from the direction of Maam. The Column were immediately assembled, given instructions, and ordered to pre-arranged positions on the slopes around the house. By the time they were in position it was light enough to recognise the approaching men as R.I.C. There were 20 R.I.C. led by a District Inspector.

When the R.I.C. turned off the main road 300 yards away, to approach the house, fire was opened on them. They immediately took day cover and replied, and a pitched battle ensued which lasted till approx. 4.30.p.m. when I3 lorries of reinforcements accompanied by an armoured car, under the personal command of Chief Commissioner Cruise, arrived.

The Column retreated in good order keeping up occasional fire and got safely away without suffering any casualties.

The R.I.C. had 3 casualties; one dead & two wounded.
