In reply to your letter (Ref no. II./R.B./26)
There was a man named CARRIGAN who went
under the name of CORRIGAN who died of wounds
received in the fighting of Easter Week 1916. He died in
Jervis St. Hospital. He was a "refugee" from Glasgow
and went under the name of CORRIGAN, as he was
"Wanted" by the British as a Conscript.

On arrival in Dublin from Glasgow he was posted
to "B." Coy., 1st Dublin Batt. I. V. His Coy Commander
was Capt. Frank Daly, whom I have interviewed in the
matter. He says he knew this man, and knew that he
died of wounds in Jervis Street Hospital. He could not
say in what area Carrigan alias Corrigan received his
wounds - nor can I, as he was a stranger little was
known of him.

As you point out I notice the conflict in dates (the
names) I hope I have made clear) but then it was a time
of great confusion. The British Casualty lists give him
as "Corrigan, C., North Frederick Street" and as being
buried in Glasnevin "between Easter and 11th July" (1916).
The Volunteers Dependents Fund in their list of "Men
who were killed while fighting for Ireland during

[P.T.O.]

Easter Week, 1916" give the name as "CARRIGAN"
Charles.

Your assumption is correct that 28 North Frederick St. was the H.Q. of the Hibernian Rifles. Carrigan shows Carrigan in giving this address at the Hospital is explained by the fact that about 25 of these "Refugees" from Glasgow, Manchester, Liverpool and London were billeted in H. R. H.Q. whilst arrangements were being made by I.V.H.Q. to have them billeted at Larkfield, Kinnage.

Trusting the foregoing may help you in this case, may I say that I shall at all times be very pleased to give you any assistance or information within my knowledge.



I am desired by the Military Service Registration Board to acquaint you that an application, under above Act, has been received from Mrs. Catherine Carrigan, 65, Eglinton Street, Glasgow, in respect of her son, Charles, who, it is stated, was wounded during Easter Week. A Certificate showing that the death of a Christopher Corrigan, late of 28, North Frederick Street, Dublin, took place at Jervis Street Hospital on 25th April, 1916, has been obtained; also a recent Press Cutting showing that a Charles Carrigan died on 28th April, 1916. Further, an application for compensation in respect of the death of her son, Cormac E. Carrigan, was received from Mrs. Carrigan in June, 1932 - this son having, according to the application, "lost his life in the Rising of 1916." In the course of correspondence on the subject, Mrs. Carrigan states "He fought in the G.P.O. While vacating it he was shot and died in Jervis Street Hospital almost immediately. He was a member of the Glasgow Battalion, 'A' Company, Irish Volunteers."

You will note the confusion of names and dates involved in the case, and the Board would be very grateful for the receipt of any definite information respecting it which may be in your possession.
