

I beg to report that I made enquiries and ascertained that Mrs. Margaret Evans (late Fogarty) with her husband, Robert Evans, and her son, Thomas Fogarty, occupy a top back room in the tenement house, 57, Mountjoy Square, at a weekly rent of ten shillings.

Claimant was not known to have enjoyed any private income prior to the death of her son - Patrick Fogarty.

She was not known to have had any regular employment prior to the death of her deceased husband. son.

She is not in possession of a holding.

Her present husband - Robert Evans - is aged 69 years. He is in delicate health and unable to work. He is in receipt of seven shillings and six pence per week (Disability Allowance).

Claimant has one son, Thomas Fogarty, living with her. He is a tailor and contributes £1: 14: 0 per week towards her upkeep.


Her deceased son was also a tailor and carried on business at 94, Talbot Street. He contributed £3 per week towards the upkeep of the family.

As a result of my enquiries, I believe that applicant was partially dependent on the deceased.

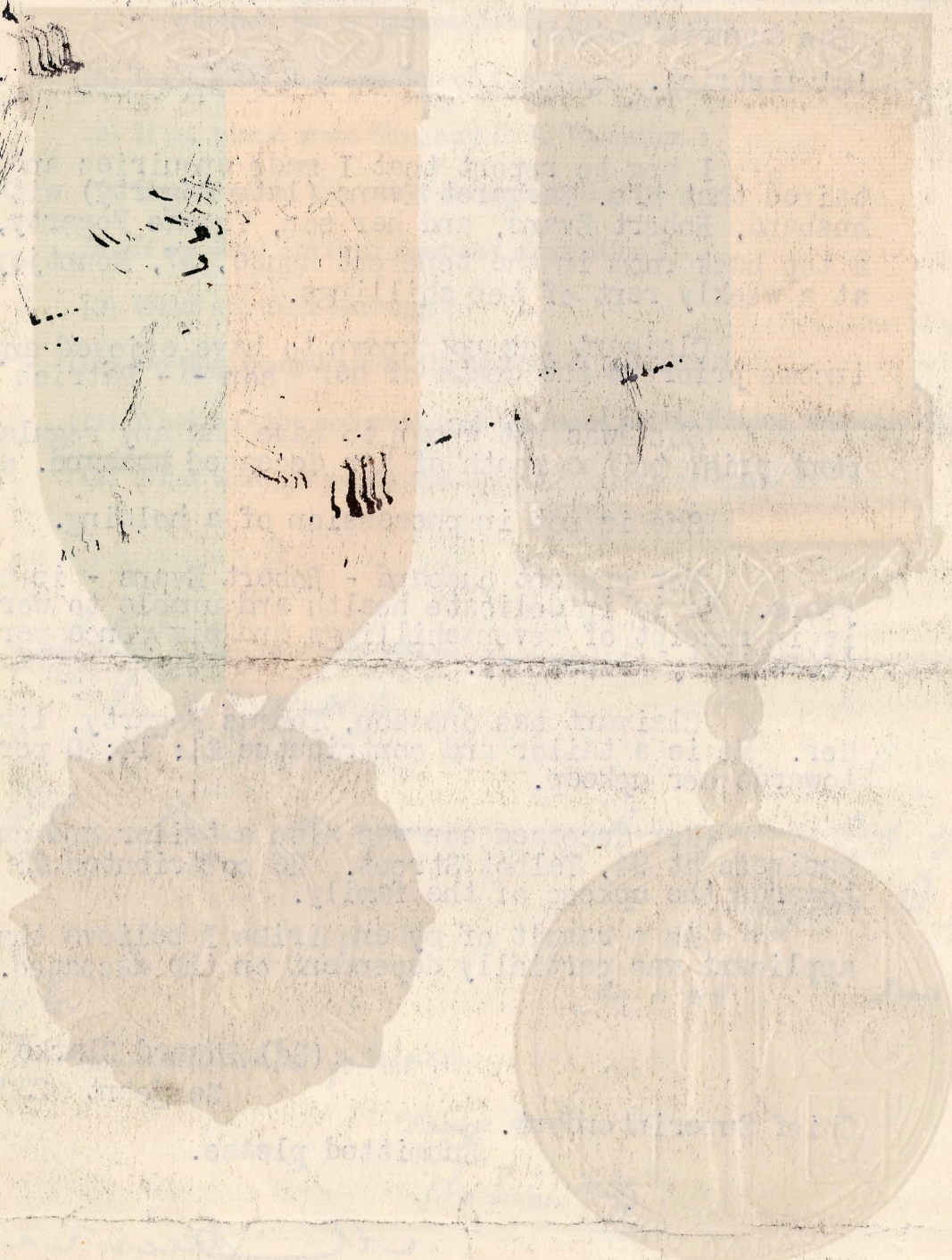

Owing to my attendance at the Defence Plans Division Course this month and consequent increased pressure of work at Headquarters, I have been unable to spare the time to make enquiries into this case until yesterday when I was enabled to confirm certain information of which I was already in possession. I give hereunder the answers to the enquiries on your Questionnaire Form.

1920/

1. The deceased, Patrick Fogarty, was a member of the Irish Volunteers and was on duty when the circumstances which resulted in his fatal illness, arose. He was a Section Leader of "F" Company, 2nd. Battalion, Dublin Brigade in April/and was on duty with his Unit at Mountjoy Gaol during the big hunger strike, when "F" Company of the 2nd. Battalion was employed outside the Gaol for the purpose of holding the crowd in check, as public feeling was very high and the precincts of the Gaol was strongly held by British troops. Fogarty received a very severe wetting one of those days and contracted pneumonia from which he died in less than a week. A lengthy notice of his services in the Irish Volunteers and of the circumstances concerning his death, was published in the current issue of "Old Ireland", Vol. 2. No. 12. dated 24/4/20. Fogarty belonged to the 1st. Battalion, Dublin Brigade previous to and during 1916. I was not acquainted with him at that time nor until he transferred into "F" Company of the 2nd. Battalion, after his release from Lewes Gaol. Possibly Ex. Captain John Ward, 1. Wigan Road, Drumcondra, may recollect him also as he belonged to "F" Company of the 2nd. Battalion and in addition fought at Cabra in Easter Week.

2. I believe Fogarty was treated by Dr. McGrath, North Strand, during his illness. I presume that would have only been for the few days before his death.

I understand that Fogarty was always in excellent health though possibly his constitution may have been undermined during his stay in Portland and Lewes Gaols, otherwise it would seem unusual for him to contract pneumonia and succumb to it four days after being drenched in the rain when other men of his own Unit felt no ill effects.

4. Deceased was a tailor by trade and managed his own business which he carried on in premises over Peadar Clancy's shop in Talbot Street. This was his whole time work and I believe was very lucrative, enabling him to help in the support of his mother.

9. Mrs Evans, who is aged about sixty is not in very good circumstances and occupies a single top back room in 57 Mountjoy Square. Her husband is about seventy years of age and is beyond work. I understand he gets a small pension amounting to 7/6d. per week. I think it is obvious that were Patrick Fogarty alive he would still be contributing to his mother's support. He was unmarried at the time of his death.

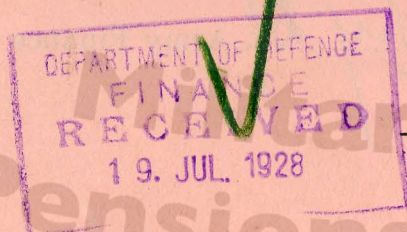

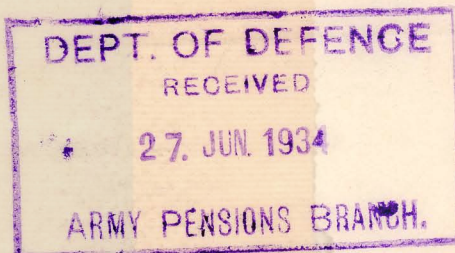

A Bhean Uasal,

I am desired by Mr. Aiken to refer to representations made by you to the Minister for Local Government and Public Health in connection with your claim for an award under the Army Pensions Acts, and to state that as your claim has already been dealt with under the Army Pensions Act, 1927, and a Gratuity awarded, he is precluded from entertaining a fresh application from you under the Army Pensions Act, 1932.

For your information, I am to state that the Army Pensions Acts provide for allowances to dependants, in cases where the claimant was totally dependent on the deceased person prior to his death. Gratuities may be paid in cases of partial dependency, but then only in necessitous cases, or where special circumstances are found to exist.

The Gratuity awarded you was based on the extent of your dependency on your deceased son, regard being had to the maximum Gratuity which could be awarded.

The Acts make no provision for the consideration of the worsening of circumstances after the death of the deceased.

Mr. Aiken regrets, therefore, that in the circumstances no further award can be made to you under the terms of the Army Pensions Acts.
