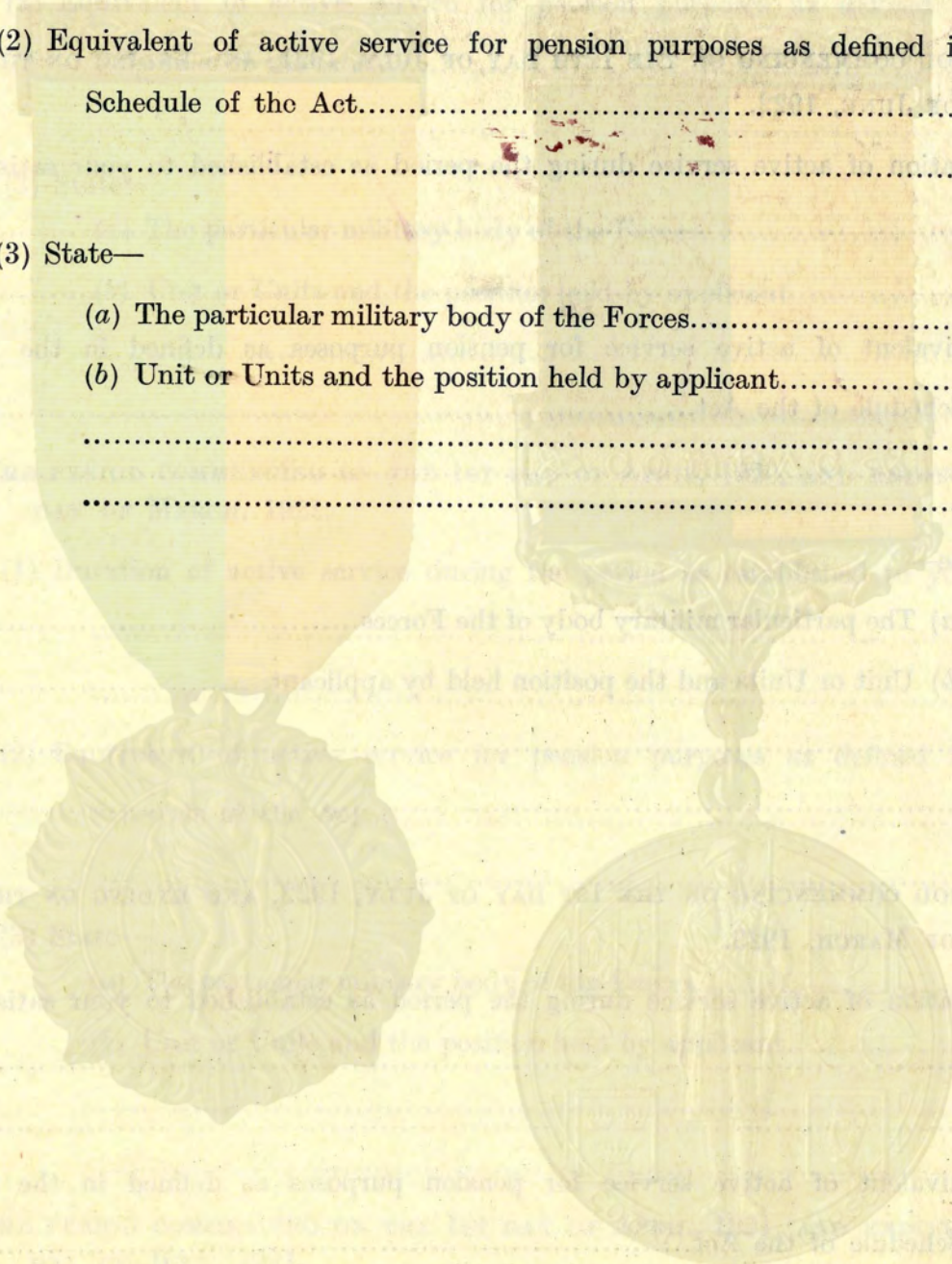

Gentlemen:-

I received your letter some time ago stating that I am not eligible for the I.R.A. Pension. I cannot see why I am not as I think section 3(I) and 2 of the Act of 1934 should apply to my case.

I served with Com. Liam Mellows and continued with the I.R.A. until 1919 when I left for the U.S.A.

I will give you a brief account of my activities during that time. I joined the Sinn Fein Organization which my Fathers, brothers and some others organized in Athenry. I was also a member of the Volunteers.

When Com. Mellows came to organize the Co. Galway he often took me along with him to the out lying Districts., until he was arrested and sent to Stafford jail England.

Capt. Lawrence Lardner was next in command. This was in 1916. On Easter Sunday morning I was sent out with dispatches to some of the Country Districts. On Easter Monday I was with my own Company having my own rifle, revolver, and bicycle.

Capt. Lardner detailed me to watch for movements of the police, trains, and to meet any of the Country Companies that would come into town. I was to keep in contact with him all the time, which I did.

My Father was one of the first to be arrested in Athenry. My brothers were with their Companies.

I went to the Farm-yard a few times that night and to Moyode Castle. I knew I was watched and followed by the Police but I managed to get through especially at night.

During that week I was arrested and sent to Arbor Hill and from there to Stafford. We were visited by the late Lawrence Ginnell M.P. Latter Mr. Ginnell spoke in the House of Commons and accused the British Government with jailing Minors and Criminals together. (This was news for the foreign press) When he was asked to prove his accusation he mentioned my name and demanded my release. ~~xxxxxxx~~ The Home Secretary replied that it would not be safe because of my record and that I had two brothers still at large. My brothers were captured later and I was released that year with other prisoners.

In 1918 we had a General Election and on election day Capt. Lardner sent me to Loughrea. There had been several riots during the day. That night the R.I.C. were forcing their way into the Sinn Fein Headquarters where some other R.I.C. men were inside I put a bullet through the Co. Inspector's helmet (sorry I missed)

and the English soldiers took over the town after that.

A warrant was issued for my arrest, charging me with attempted murder. I was tipped <sup>off</sup> through a shop-keeper who was told by a good friend in the R.I.C. (an Officer) when and where they were going to search for me.

After this went on for some time I was advised to try to get to the U.S.A. as my health was getting bad. I succeeded in getting in touch with Com. Mellows in the U.S.A.

In July 1919 I went to Liverpool and located a Neil Kerr Sr. who got me a seaman's book (alias William Burke) I got a job as a fireman on a ship sailing for New York. After I landed here I went to Com. Mellows' address where I lived with him until he left for Ireland again. I was very anxious to return at that time but it was not advisable for many reasons.

My Father ~~two~~ brothers, and two sisters were active during the Black and Tan war. My brothers would not approve of my coming home at that time as I was more useful here and beside I was able to help my Mother and younger <sup>brother</sup> by sending home some money to them.

I went back to Ireland in 1924 and stayed one year. I returned to Ireland in 1935 when I filed my application for the I.R.A. Pension. I requested an audience with your committee and it was granted to me. I was asked to bring a witness at my own expense. I brought the late Capt. Lardner. We testified before the late Sheamus Robertson whom I knew from Stafford jail.

My testimony you have there. That includes my activities here in the U.S.A. which you seem to have overlooked.

It is nearly ten years since I filed my application. I will appreciate very much if you give it your attention again, as there must be some misunderstanding.

I think my 1916 record should at least entitle me to some consideration.

Thanking you very much and hoping for an early reply.

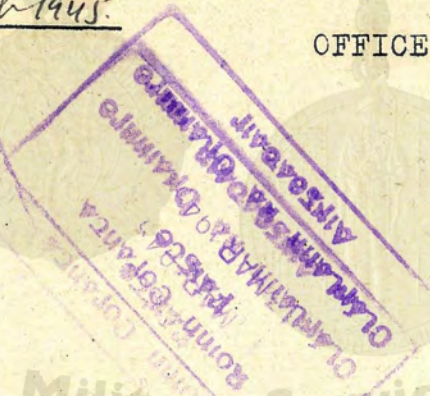
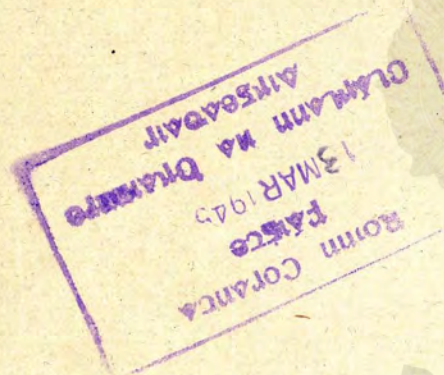
