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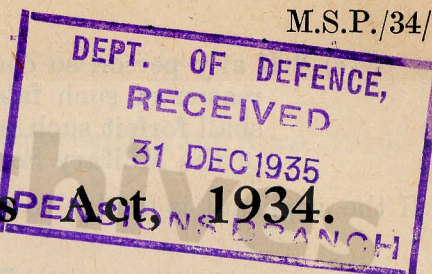

RULES FOR DETERMINING NOTIONAL GRADES OF RANK IN THE FORCES HELD BY PERSONS SERVING IN THE FORCES.

1.—(1) Any person who at any date was either Chief of Staff, Deputy Chief of Staff, Adjutant General, a Divisional Officer Commanding, or Quartermaster General shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank A.

(2) Any person who at any date was either—

- (a) a General Headquarters Officer acting as Director of any one of the following services, namely Organisation, Intelligence, Engineering and Munitions, or
- (b) a Brigade Officer Commanding whose brigade was at that date not less than one thousand in strength,

shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank B.

(3) Any person who at any date was either—

- (a) a Brigade Officer Commanding whose brigade at that date was less than one thousand in strength, or
- (b) a Divisional Vice Officer Commanding, or
- (c) a Divisional Adjutant, or
- (d) a Divisional Quartermaster, or
- (e) a Battalion Commandant whose battalion was at that date not less than three hundred in strength, or
- (f) a Brigade Vice Officer Commanding whose brigade was at that date not less than one thousand in strength, or
- (g) a Brigade Adjutant whose brigade was at that date not less than one thousand in strength, or
- (h) a Brigade Quartermaster whose brigade was at that date not less than one thousand in strength, or
- (i) a Column Commander whose column was at that date not less than thirty in strength, or
- (j) a General Headquarters Officer who at that date was acting as Director of Medical Services, or
- (k) a General Headquarters Officer who at that date was acting as Director of any Service, other than that of Medical Services, or one of the Services mentioned in sub-paragraph (a) of the immediately preceding paragraph,

shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank C.

(4) A person who at any date—

- (a) was a Battalion Commandant whose battalion at that date was less than three hundred in strength, or
- (b) was a Company Captain whose company at that date was not less than sixty in strength, or
- (c) was, at that date, a Captain on the General Headquarters Staff or on a Divisional Staff, or
- (d) was, in the case of a company which at that date was not less than one hundred and twenty in strength, where the company had at that date one Lieutenant only, such Lieutenant or, where the company had at that date two Lieutenants only, one or other of such Lieutenants, or, where the company had at that date three or more Lieutenants, one or other of the two Lieutenants who were at that date respectively second and third in command, or
- (e) was, in the case of a company which at that date was less than one hundred and twenty in strength but not less than one hundred in strength, where such company had at that date one Lieutenant only, such Lieutenant or where such company had at that date two or more Lieutenants, the Lieutenant who was at that date second in command, or
- (f) was a Brigade Officer, other than a Brigade Officer who is deemed by virtue of paragraph (2) or (3) of this Rule to have held at that date either Rank B or Rank C, or

- (b) such unit shall be deemed to be at that date at the same strength as it was at the time of his arrest.

3. 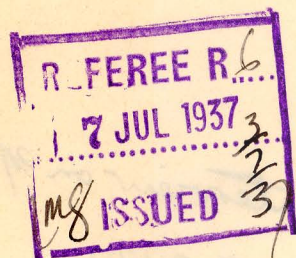
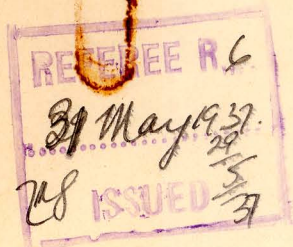

The bearer Mr Laurence Lawlor 29 Ard high Road was a volunteer in "A" Company, 1st Battalion, Dublin, Brigade, when I joined the Company in 1914.

He was one of the units most active members and was appointed Section-Commander in 1915.

He took part in the 1916 Rebellion and was fighting with his Company, in the Church St & North Brunswick St Area, under the Four Courts Command.

He surrendered with his Company, on Sunday, 30th April 1916 and was deported to Stafford jail being subsequently interned in Frongoch.

He was released in December 1916 and re-joined his Company immediately.

He was one of the late Peadar Breslin's most active men who procured (under arms) rifles from Wellington Barracks and other sources, on many occasions during 1914-18.

He was also a member of the party who raided Collinstown Aerodrome, and having overpowered the Guard, captured 45 rifles and a large quantity of ammunition and equipment.

He was an active member of the Company, and took part in Potlwork under arms in the Company's Area and was always ready to carry out all orders issued to him.

He resigned from the Company when the Truce was declared in 1921

SWORN STATEMENT made before THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE on
7.7.1937, by LAURENCE JAMES LAWLOR. (21086).

Q. When did you join the Volunteers?

A. In ~~xxxx~~ December, 1913, in the Columbcille Hall.

Q. Were you out in Easter Week?

A. Yes, and prior to that.

1st Period:

Q. What were you doing on Easter Sunday?

A. I was mobilised at about five o'clock in the morning to get the Company together. I was chief mobiliser for the Company.

Q. Did you parade on Sunday?

A. Yes.

Q. Were you at home on Sunday night?

A. Yes.

Q. Were you mobilised on Monday?

A. Yes, on the Monday morning. I paraded at Columcille Hall. We went first to North Brunswick Street. We were there for a day and then went on to Church St.

Q. Were you in the Four Courts Garrison Area?

A. Yes, all the time.

Q. Were you ever sent out of it?

A. No, except that we went up to Church Street when the Military were coming down with a Machine-gun. We were called out for a charge.

Q. You were at the burning of Linenhall Bks. Did you do that?

A. Yes, during the week, on Tuesday or Wednesday.

Q. You were guarding prisoners?

A. Yes.

Q. Did you spend long on that?

A. I was there for only about two hours. I was taken out again. There were other things to be done.

Q. You were called out for a bayonet charge.

A. Yes, with Donnchad O'Callaghan.

Q. Where did you spend most of the time?

A. We were up and down. We were up at the Hospital sometimes, and then out for an attack in Queen Street, then to Church-street, Grangegorman and the Broadstone. I never left the Four Courts Area all the week.

Q. Were you in the surrender?

A. Yes, on Sunday morning. Fr. Augustine brought us the note from Pearse. I surrendered with Paddy Holohan and about thirty men.

2nd Period:

- Q. Had you anything special to do in the three weeks before the Rising?
- A. Yes; we were filling buck-shot cartridges, and I was up at St. Enda's putting up poles for the wireless station.
- Q. Were you working at a job yourself?
- A. No. There was a carpenters' strike on at the time.
- Q. How long did you spend on that work?
- A. We were about three weeks on it, day after day. Pearse was first going to put it in front of the house, but it was not high enough, and we had to take it to Quarry Hill and had to punch a hole through a rock.
- Q. You were in the surrender on Sunday morning?
- A. Yes.
- Q. What gaol were you released from?
- A. I was released from Frongoch on Christmas Eve. I was in Stafford before that.
- Q. Were you an internee?
- A. I was just an internee, not sentenced.
- Q. Did you keep on with the Company when you came out?
- A. Yes. I helped to reorganise the Company when I came out.

3rd Period:

- Q. You were guarding a prison gate, City Hall, and Arbour Hill Bks. for the Volunteer Convention and doing police duty during the Armagh elections?
- A. Yes, in Poyntz Pass.

4th Period:

- Q. You were guarding Barracks, the Volunteer Convention, and had a raid on Portobello and Wellington Bks.
- A. We used get rifles out of here over the railings on to the canal.
- Q. How many rifles did you get?
- A. Six, on one occasion, and three and four on other occasions.
- Q. Did you raid for them?
- A. ~~XXXX~~ We used to buy them. They were left here in one of the houses and we had to get in and take them and leave a guard outside. A man would then throw them over the railings.
- Q. How many raids had you here in Wellington Bks.?
- A. We had four raids here.
- Q. How many raids had you in Portobello Bks.?
- A. One in Portobello, off a soldier. I think it was three we got that time.

Q. You had a raid on Collinstown Aerodrome?

A. Yes; I was in that raid.

Q. Did you actually go in?

A. Yes, got the ropes and tied up the fellows.

Q. That was in March, 1919. Did you bring some of the rifles away?

A. They were sent away in a car.

Q. On your Form you say you brought 15 rifles to No.5, Blackhall Street.

A. Yes. They were taken and then divided up. Fifteen were to come to No.5, Blackhall Street. I went up the following night and we took them away to Clonliffe Road I think it was in a cab.

Q. You eventually brought them to 5-Blackhall Street?

A. Yes.

5th Period:

Q. You were drilling, training and doing guard at funeral of Captain Healy?

A. Yes.

6th Period:

Q. You were attending parades, drilling and watching the movements of the military?

A. My father-in-law was shot three weeks after I was married.

Q. Had you any actual fighting in the Black-and-Tan time?

A. No. After the shooting of my father-in-law I was actually a marked man. I was followed around.

Q. That was in Manor-street?

A. Yes. I could not be sent on any job in case I would be bringing the enemy on our tracks.

Q. What was your father-in-law's name?

A. His name was Peter O'Carroll. They raided the house three days after the wedding.

Q. When was he shot?

A. On 16th October, 1920, I think.

Q. Did you take part in any of the ambushes?

A. No.

Q. Were you "on the run?"

A. I was. I had to leave the house to keep out of the way.

Q. What was the idea of sending you to Cork?

A. They were pressed for rifles in Cork for the ambushes. Revolvers were more used in the city here than rifles so if any of us had the rifles which we could not use they were sent to the country.

Q. Were you ever on armed guard duty in the Black-and-Tan time?

A. No.

7th Period:

Q. You were attending parades, drilling and spying on military posts; did you do much of that?

A. Yes; I was watching Byrne (Hoppy) and he was watching me. He was shot in Jervis Street.

Q. Did you do much watching of him?

A. Yes. He used to follow me around and I used go to Manor Street for dinner sometimes and he used follow us up. I had nothing to do with his shooting only to report his movements.

Q. What military posts did you spy on?

A. On Collins Bks. - Royal Bks. that time.

Q. Just to report movements?

A. Yes. I knew one of the police out of the Married Quarters.

Q. Is there anything else you want to add?

A. No.
