SUMMARY.

MARGARET O'NEILL - File No. 26330 - 20th JULY, 1937.

Applicant joined Cumann na mBan in 1917. In the 3rd Period a training camp was situated on their land for four months during which time she carried despatches and helped in the making of ammunition in between times. From the 4th Period she would appear to have eebn officially recognised as a despatch carrier between Brigade, Battalion and column and in this connection her activities were varied and constant, and continued right up to the end of the Civil War. In the 5th, 6th and 7th Periods she attended a number of wounded men. She also scouted and carried arms for volunteers crossing the Bandon river periodically and saved Dan Holland on one occasion from arrest. It must be understood in this connection that her house was constantly used by the column all during the Tan War.

In the Truce period, in addition to the usual activities, she rendered First Aid to two R.I.C. who were hostages, for about two weeks.

In the Civil War period, in addition to special despatch work, she attended wounded on some occasions and generally continued active until the Cease Fire. From that on until the men were released from jail they kept men on the run.

SWORN STATEMENT MADE BEFORE THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE BY MARGARET O'NEILL - File No. 26330 - 20th JULY, 1937. Q. Are you a sister of Mrs. Walsh? Yes. A Q. When did you join Cumann na mBan? A. 1917. 3rd Period. General activities of Cumann na mBan, collecting funds, making First Aid outfits? A. Q. Were you carrying despatches even in 1917 day and night? Yes. We had a training camp in our place for four months at the end of 1917. I took all notes and despatches to it. A. The camp was in an old house of ours. Q. Did you make much ammunition? Yes, I made slugs continuously, every spare moment. A. 4th/5th Period. Men were on the run at this period? Q. Yes, they stayed in our house all during the 4th and 5th Periods. We had an old house on the place with beds made up. A. they slept there continuously and we gave them food. Q. Did you look after the arms in dumps? es, we had three dumps on our land. A. Q. Did you clean them? I ENEXEXE never cleaned them but I got men to clean them A. when necessary. Did you pass out the guns? Q. Nobody would get anything unless we were there, we were in charge. Did you carry despatches at that time? Q. Yes, all that time. I was appointed officially by the A Brigade Staff to carry despatches between the Battalion and the Brigade and the Company and the Battalion. I was also appointed despatch carrier for the A.S.U. when it was formed. Did you assist in helping your brother after the Rathclarin Q. ambush? Yes, to dress his wounds. I travelled 20 miles to look A. after him and to see that he was all right. How long did you spend nursing him?
Only two days. I would be missed from home and it would Q. A look too suspicious. After the shooting of a policeman at Kilbrittain in December Q. 1919 Commandant Hir ley and other members of the I.R.A. had to leave the district and you had to stay near their new H.Q. about 12 miles from your home to do despatch work? Yes, to keep touch with Kilbrittain A.

How long did you stay there?

- Were they often around your area? Q. They were continuously there. There was never a day but we had some of them.

- Did you often carry despatches? I often came back after Often, twice a night sometimes. A. carrying one despatch and had to go off with another.
- You held up officer in charge of a British column who was Q. attempting to arrest or shoot a prominent officer. He was killed later that day and with two other girls you brought his body to your house and held a wake there in defiance of the enemy who came to seize and take away the body. also assisted in arranging funeral and attended same under orders of O/C. of A.S.U.. You arranged for the removal orders of O/C. of A.S.U.. of the bodies from the British military of Commandant Charles Hurley and other men killed in action at Crossbarry and assisted in arranging for their funerals, is that right? Yes, my sister went to town and I made the arrangements. A.
- You scouted roads and bridges when I.R.A. had to cross the Bandon river by bridges which were usually under enemy supervision and carried arms and ammunition across these bridges when necessary? Did you do much of that?
 Yes. I am sure I did that every week, perhaps two days one week and then two weeks would pass by without my doing it.

- You were advised by the Brigade O/C. and Battalion O/C. to Q. leave the country for a while but you continued on duty as they said you were needed? A.
- You made weekly Church door collections for prisoners dependants?

A. Yes.

- In January 1921 you conveyed two Brigade officers to a meeting in Ballyroe, you had to arrange for cars and girls to scout them. You had regular calls for from all men on an average of 30 weekly all through the Tan and Civil wars?

- Q. Who were the Brigade officers you conveyed?
 A. Liam Deasy and Tom Barry.
 - Q. You were specially sent into Timoleague to watch the movements of military after Skeaf ambush and dressed wounded men after the ambush?
- A. Yes, it was an accidental ambush.
- Q. You travelled back with the column after Commandant Hurley's funeral as attack had been arranged on military at Inchy Bridge?

 A. Yes.

- Q. You saved Battalion Quartermaster, Dan Holland, from arrest by party of military how did you save him?

- You attended lectures given by Dr. Price; gave practice lectures and instructions in First Aid; you got badly beaten when resisting arrest and was scarcely able to walk for days; you carried despatches arms and ammunition when necessary was that often in the last three months of the Tan war?

 - Q. You arranged for the funeral of Captain Con Murphy; carried despatches to A.S.U. before attack on Roscarberry Barracks cycling through snow for two days?

These young and inexperienced soldiers have been plunged into circumstances infinitely trying to nerves and temper and not in one single instance have they acted unworthing. This is an extract from a paragraph appearing in the Saily Wail of fine 3" on the conduct of the Regular army in Ireland which the Frish Bulletin steles has been inserted in orders and circulated amongst the troops in Ireland. The following statement by less II. Meil of Kelbrittain be book is a sufficient commentary -On Monday meetning May 9th about 7 a.m. fifty soldiers under an official surrounded and house. a number of those rushed upstains entiring the bedrooms of my father and sister who were both in led. The office asked them to get up but my father was unable to do so They then searched the rooms. My Mother and I were having breakfast in the ketchen when one soldier suzed my cup of tea and drank it of immediately. The other soldiers were moving about and my Woth noticed one taking eggs from a box in the dairy. We went towards the dairy door and saw some of them drink and spell cream and they also took about 6 lbs of butter. My sister called the attention of the officer in charge to the leating and he denied it Just then a soldier came along with a capful of eggs, the cap dropped from him as he was passing the offices and the eggs got broken. That was sufficient proof and the office said of you will keep your b- mouth shut I will pay for them. The office then told me to go upstains and get my clothes as I was under arrest. I did this and seterted was followed by two soldiers and for that reason cans downstains again without changing my clothes. My sister and I were then ordered outside the door but we refused to go as our mother was feeling unwell and the solders locked all the doors and put the keys in their pockets My sister went to work as usual outside and when feeding pegs was held up by two soldiers who twited her hands behind his back

They told her they wanted her up the road for some time but she said

they should take her as she would not go willingly with them. The office said I will bury your b - head in the manure heap." They then pushed her to the gate about forty yards away and kept her hands tursted all the time. Thy mother protested against this treatment of he daughlis and so got roughly knocked about. The asked what was the charge against them and got no conserved. She stood between me and the soldiers as the office gave the order to pull me out. They tred to do so but she came between us and cling to me The said she would not let the guls go as they were all she had now and the office replied you want have them long either" I told the offer-in-charge he should be responsible if anything happened my nother as the Doctor had told me that any shock or excitement would prove fatal as she was subject to paralysis and had a weak heart. Part I. is to be completed where the applicant had, in addition to the required pre-Truce Service, Service in the Forces in the period commencing the 1st July, 1922. Part II. is to be completed where the applicant's qualifying service in the Forces was pre-Truce only. Only one of those two parts is to be completed by any one applicant. Part III. is of general application and should be completed by all applicants.
- (b) Before completing particulars as to rank the applicant should read carefully the First Schedule to the Act and also the definitions of the expressions "first critical date" and "second critical date" which are appended to this form for the information of applicants. He should then complete his replies to the questions in the terms of Rules 1 and 2 of the First Schedule which are applicable to his case, e.g.:—

was "a Divisional Adjutant" or

was "a Battalion Quartermaster whose Battalion was (at the critical date) not less than one hundred in strength," or

was "an officer of Fianna Eireann commanding one hundred members or more."

If applicant's case falls within either Rule 3 or Rule 4 of the First Schedule full particulars of the claim as required by those Rules should be given, if necessary, in a separate statement.

- (c) All statements made in this application will be carefully investigated, and satisfactory evidence must be forthcoming on request to substantiate each and every statement made.
- (d) "If any person with a view to obtaining either for himself or any other person a grant or payment of a pension under this Act, makes, signs, or uses any declaration, application or other written statement knowing the same to be false, such person shall be guilty of an offence under this section and shall be liable on summary conviction thereof to a fine not exceeding £25 (twenty-five pounds) or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months or at the discretion of the Court to both such fine and imprisonment." (Sec. 19 (1) of the Military Service Pensions Act, 1934).

(e) "If any person so convicted as aforesaid is in receipt of a pension obtained by reason of such false declaration, application, or other written statement he shall forfeit such pension as from the date of such conviction." (Sec. 19 (2) of the Military Service Pensions Act, 1934).

If the applicant is unable to read, the above note should be read to him by the witness.

RULES FOR DETERMINING NOTIONAL GRADES OF RANK IN THE FORCES HELD BY PERSONS SERVING IN THE FORCES.

1.—(1) Any person who at any date was either Chief of Staff, Deputy Chief of Staff, Adjutant General, a Divisional Officer Commanding, or Quartermaster General shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank A.

- (2) Any person who at any date was either-
 - (a) a General Headquarters Officer acting as Director of any one of the following services, namely Organisation, Intelligence, Engineering and Munitions, or
 - (b) a Brigade Officer Commanding whose brigade was at that date not less than one thousand in strength,

shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank B.

- (3) Any person who at any date was either-
 - (a) a Brigade Officer Commanding whose brigade at that date was less than one thousand in strength, or
 - (b) a Divisional Vice Officer Commanding, or
 - (c) a Divisional Adjutant, or
 - (d) a Divisional Quartermaster, or
 - (e) a Battalion Commandant whose battalion was at that date not less than three hundred in strength, or
 - (f) a Brigade Vice Officer Commanding whose brigade was at that date not less than one thousand in strength, or
 - (g) a Brigade Adjutant whose brigade was at that date not less than one thousand in strength, or
 - (h) a Brigade Quartermaster whose brigade was at that date not less than one thousand in strength, or
 - (i) a Column Commander whose column was at that date not less than thirty in strength, or
 - (j) a General Headquarters Officer who at that date was acting as Director of Medical Services,
 - (k) a General Headquarters Officer who at that date was acting as Director of any Service, other than that of Medical Services, or one of the Services mentioned in sub-paragraph (α) of the immediately preceding paragraph,

shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank C.

- (4) A person who at any date—
 - (a) was a Battalion Commandant whose battalion at that date was less than three hundred in strength, or
 - (b) was a Company Captain whose company at that date was not less than sixty in strength, or
 - (c) was, at that date, a Captain on the General Headquarters Staff or on a Divisional Staff, or
 - (d) was, in the case of a company which at that date was not less than one hundred and twenty in strength, where the company had at that date one Lieutenant only, such Lieutenant or, where the company had at that date two Lieutenants only, one or other of such Lieutenants, or, where the company had at that date three or more Lieutenants, one or other of the two Lieutenants who were at that date respectively second and third in command, or
 - (e) was, in the case of a company which at that date was less than one hundred and twenty in strength but not less than one hundred in strength, where such company had at that date one Lieutenant only, such Lieutenant or where such company had at that date two or more Lieutenants, the Lieutenant who was at that date second in command, or
 - (f) was a Brigade Officer, other than a Brigade Officer who is deemed by virtue of paragraph (2) or (3) of this Rule to have held at that date either Rank B or Rank C, or
 - (g) was a Battalion Vice Officer Commanding whose battalion at that date was not less than one hundred in strength, or
 - (h) was a Battalion Adjutant whose battalion was at that date not less than one hundred in strength, or
 - (i) was a Battalion Quartermaster whose battalion was at that date not less than one hundred in strength, or

- (j) was a General Headquarters Officer other than a General Headquarters Officer who was at that date acting as a Director of any Service, or
- (k) was a Divisional Officer other than a Divisional Officer Commanding, a Divisional Vice Officer Commanding, a Divisional Adjutant or a Divisional Quartermaster, or
- (l) was a Column Commander whose column at that date was less than thirty in strength, or
- (m) was a Medical Officer other than a General Headquarters Officer who at that date was acting as Director of Medical Services,

shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank D.

- (5) Any person who complies with the following conditions, namely:
 - (a) was at any date an officer, and
 - (b) is not deemed by virtue of any of the preceding paragraphs of this Rule to have held at that date any grade of rank,

shall be deemed for the purposes of this Act to have held at that date Rank E.

- (6) Any person who at any date held the rank of non-commissioned officer or private shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank E.
- (7) None of the foregoing provisions of this Rule shall apply to any person who at any date was a member of Fianna Eireann or of Cumann na mBan and was not at any date a member of Oglaigh na hEireann (Irish Republican Army) or of the Irish Volunteers, and in lieu thereof the following provisions shall have effect in relation to any such person, that is to say:—
 - (a) any person who at any date:—
 - (i) was a member of the headquarters staff or executive of Fianna Eireann or Cumann na mBan, or
 - (ii) was an officer of Fianna Eireann or Cumann na mBan commanding one hundred members or more of either of those bodies, or
 - (iii) was an officer of Fianna Eireann or Cumann na mBan senior to an officer of either of those bodies commanding one hundred members or more of either of those bodies.

shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank D, and

- (b) any person who at any date was a member of Fianna Eireann or Cumann na mBan and who is not deemed by virtue of the foregoing sub-paragraph (a) of this paragraph to have held Rank D, shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank E.
- 2. Where an officer whose grade of rank at any date is, under Rule I of this Schedule, to be determined both by his actual rank in the Forces and the strength of the unit to which he belonged at that date, and such officer is, at that date, absent from duty by reason of imprisonment on account of his activities as a member of the Forces, the following provisions shall, for the purposes of the said Rule I, have effect in relation to such officer, that is to say:—
 - (a) such officer shall be deemed to have held at that date the actual rank in the Forces which he held at the date of his arrest, and
 - (b) such unit shall be deemed to be at that date at the same strength as it was at the time of his arrest.
- 3. Where the case of any person does not fall within the provisions of Rule I of this Schedule, the Referee may determine the particular grade of rank which such person is to be deemed to have held on any date, and in so determining the Referee shall have regard to the following matters, that is to say:—
 - (a) the appointment held by such person,
 - (b) the services performed by such person,
 - (c) the principles of grading set forth in the said Rule I.
- 4. Where any person, whose case at a particular date falls within the provisions of Rule I of this Schedule, was, at that date, engaged in service of a special character, the Referee may, in making his report under this Act in relation to the grade of rank held by such person on such date, report that the grade of rank held by him on such date is a grade of rank higher than the grade which, but for this Rule, would be the grade of rank held by him on that date.

DEFINITION OF THE FIRST AND SECOND CRITICAL DATES.

1. In the case of a person who served in the Forces during the period commencing on the 1st day of July, 1922, and ending on the 30th day of September, 1923,

The expression "the first critical date" means the 11th day of July, 1921; and the expression "the second critical date" means:—

(a) in the case of a person who served in the Forces on the 1st day of July, 1922, the 1st day of July, 1922 and

- (b) in the case of a person who did not serve in the Forces on the 1st day of July, 1922, but who served in the Forces at any time during the period commencing on the 2nd day of July, 1922, and ending on the 30th day of September, 1923, the date during that period on which such person first served in the Forces.
- 2. In the case of a person who did not serve in the Forces during the period commencing on the 1st day of July, 1922, and ending on the 30th day of September, 1923, but who has either:—
 - (a) served in the Forces at any time during the week commencing on the 23rd day of April, 1916, or
 - (b) served in the Forces continuously during the period commencing on the 1st day of April, 1921, and ending on the 11th day of July, 1921,

the expression "the first critical date" shall be construed as meaning the date during the said week, or if he did not serve during the said week, during the said period, on which he first served in the Forces in such week or such period (as the case may be), and

the expression "the second critical date" shall be construed as meaning the earliest date in the period between the first critical date in respect of such person, and the 12th day of July, 1921, on which such person held his highest rank in such last-mentioned period in the Forces.
