I refer to your letter of 7th February in relation to pension payments in the U.K.

Permission is hereby given, under the Exchange Control Acts 1954 to 1978, for the Department of Defence to make payments to pensioners (present and future) resident in the United Kingdom.

All pension payments to U.K. residents irrespective of amount should be branded as indicated in your letter. Payments on behalf of U.K. residents to banks in the State should be similarly marked.

A Chara,

I am directed by the Minister for Defence to refer to pensions and allowances payable under various codes administered by this Department and to state that a considerable number of the pensioners are resident in the United Kingdom.

It is understood that under recent Irish Exchange Control regulations warrants by which payment is made to pensioners in the United Kingdom must, in future, bear a brand indicating that these regulations have been complied with. I am, therefore, to request your approval for the continuing payment of the pensions concerned.

A suggested format for the necessary brand is

I am to enquire if the regulations apply (a) to all our pensions payable in the United Kingdom or only to those where the net monthly amount is over £100 and (b) to a pension where, although the payee is resident in the United Kingdom, the monthly warrant is lodged to his account in a Bank in Ireland.

I refer to recent telephone conversations (Mr. Brophy/Mrs. O'Dea) in relation to the marking of cheques payable to U.K. residents.


Where you are making a tax refund or making other current payments by cheque to a U.K. resident, the cheque should be branded:

"Irish Exchange Control regulations complied with".

The stamp which you will have made up should also make reference to the "Accountant General - Revenue Commissioners". A suggested format is set out below but this may be changed to suit your requirements.

Memo

The question of branching warrants for payment in non sterling currency was re-examined in connection with the proposed production of warrants by computer. There is no room on the face of the proposed warrant for printing by computer the words "eligible for payment in non-sterling currency etc" and as the wording of the warrant is not suitable ~~for~~ where payment is made direct to a bank account such cases are being excluded from the EOP system for the present.

The matter was discussed by phone with Mr Bernard Boen of the Central Bank and a tentative solution (to which he saw no objection at the time) put forward was that all warrants should bear a pre printed statement on the back to the effect that where the pensioner's address as disclosed on the warrant was not in one of the scheduled Territories payment could be made in non-sterling currency.

On further examination of the proposal by the EOP team, it was considered

- (a) Pre printing of such a statement on all warrants would be bound to lead to errors due to misreading its intent
- (b) The warrant would, for clarity, have to contain a list of the scheduled Territories (which may well be changed from time to time)
- (c) Warrants going ~~off~~ abroad have in any event to be selected out for the purpose of affixing postage stamps and the manual branching can be done as an extension of this operation.

In these circumstances I informed Mr Boen that we did not intend to pursue our tentative solution any further. He then informed me that having had the opportunity of discussing it with some of his colleagues, he was not in favour of it any longer.
