



SWORN STATEMENT MADE BY MYLES O'MALLEY (3577)

BEFORE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON 1.12.36.

- Q. Did you bring any papers with you?
A. Yes. I only brought two I only got the letter on Saturday when it was late. If you require any more I will get them.
- Q. We will be able to indicate as we go through the examination whether you want any more or not. When did you join the Vols?
- A. 1918.
- Q. Towards the beginning or end?
A. Towards April, the early part of it.
- Q. Did you remain in the Volunteers from that date onwards?
A. Yes.
- Q. Until when?
A. Until the finish up in 1924.
- Q. What rank did you hold?
A. Company captain.
- Q. Louisburgh Company?
A. No. F. Company. It was Louisburgh Battalion.
- Q. How many in the company?
A. 63 before the Truce, 73 after the Truce.
- Q. 63 on the date of the Truce, and 73 on the outbreak of the Civil War?
A. Yes.
- Q. Were you still company captain at the outbreak of the Civil War?
A. Yes.
- Q. What do you work at usually?
A. Previous to the outbreak of the Civil War I held a shop in Louisburgh, as a result of the activities the business went down and went wallop, the result was I had to go over to England and work in 1925, I got a few pounds and came home and got married. I am working as a gardener in the Old Head Hotel, I was doing a desperate business at one time, it was all knocked on the head owing to my activities.

4th Period:

- Q. In 1918 when you joined the Volunteers you took part in the usual drills and so forth?
A. Yes.
- Q. Were there many drills?
A. Drill every night practically.
- Q. Nothing else to do was it?
A. No. At night.
- Q. You were not drilling every night?
A. Practically every night, not all the men.

5th Period:

Q. Was that going on during the next period also?
A. Yes.

Q. Was there anything of note that occurred on you can recollect in those two years?

A. No. Only drilling and organising, and attending Sinn Fein Courts

Q. Did you do any organising outside your own company?
A. No. Only just my own company.

Q. Was there anything in the way of making shot or filling cartridges during 1918?
A. There was not in my area.

Q. Had you raids for arms?
A. Yes.

Q. Did you get much?
A. We got a lot of shotguns.

Q. Did you take part in the raids yourself?
A. Yes.

Q. Took charge of the raids?
A. Yes.

Q. About how many raids would there have been?
A. We had several. I could not give you the approximate number.

Q. Had you 20?
A. Twenty at least.

Q. Any resistance on these occasions?
A. Only in one case.

Q. Was there firing?
A. No. It was resistance in one case he threatened to blow us up if we did not go out.

Q. Did you get the gun?
A. Yes. Got the gun and made sure of that.

Q. You claimed intelligence—that was just observing enemy movements and all that?
A. Yes.

6th Period:

Q. Was it late in 1920 you were made captain of the company?
A. Yes. May 1920 when the battalion was formed.

Q. Up to that what were you?
A. I was only an ordinary private. It was only a company in Louisburgh area then there was a battalion formed and worked by P. J. Kelly.

Q. You had some raids for the collection of arms in this period?
A. Yes.

Q. Were you collecting money for arms?
A. Yes. Certainly we collected money for arms.

Q. And had court work?
A. Yes.

Q.

Q. Did you appoint men to attend courts?

A. I used to attend along with some other officers, appoint judges.

Q. Was there much court work there?

A. There was a lot of court work in Louisburgh district. We had to bring them in by force into it,

Q. You would send out a party to bring in fellows that would not want to go?

A. Yes. Certainly I often went myself.

Q. The people used to be robbers?

A. No. The fellows used to beat their wives. Fellows that were opposed to us, and would not want to recognise our courts.

Q. Was there much of that?

A. There were several cases.

Q. Had you any arms this time?

A. Yes.

Q. What kind of gun?

A. A rifle.

Q. Did you ever have to use it during this period?

A. No.

Q. You never had a scrap with the police?

A. Yes. In 1921 I had scraps with the police.

Q. In the year ending March 1921, you were in no fight?

A. Yes. I did outpost duty in Carrowkennedy. I wanted to have a rattle at them. Michael Kilroy was in charge he sent me on to this particular spot to do outpost duty along with some other men, to keep off the enemy if they came with reinforcements. He said I was as well there as in the fight. Previous to this I was sent in for provisions into Louisburgh I felt I was surrounded by the police and I patrol, I was armed he told me to put my hands up I pretended to put them up, as soon as I did I fired and jumped over a wall, they started banging, I crossed a river and dived down got up over the other side and got away. They were banging at me the whole time, I returned it.

Q. This was the police patrol?

A. Yes. Of about 10 police.

Q. What happened the provisions?

A. They got none that night, I had to go about 8 miles to a friend of mine and I got them.

Q. You went 8 miles after this little escapade?

A. Yes.

Q. Did you do outpost on more than one occasion for the column in the year ending March 1921?

A. That was the principal outpost duty I did-Carrowkennedy.

Q. There was a fight there?

A. There was a fight there.

Q. ~~THEXXXXX~~ Kilroy was in charge?

A. Yes. We beat them.

Q. Did the whole company turn out for this work?
 A. My whole company?

Q. Yes.

A. No. Only a few, they had not any arms to turn up.

Q. What kind of rifle had you?
 A. A Lee Enfield.

Q. A service rifle?
 A. Yes.

Q. Had you any ammunition for it?
 A. Often had 50 rounds on me.

Q. There were not many men armed with rifles?
 A. No.

Q. Did you go on the run in this period?

A. I was on the run practically ~~the~~ from 1918, I was on the run in November 1920, they raided for, they did not get me, I had to go on the run, I was on the run ever since.

Q. You gave up the shop?
 A. I did.

Q. November 1920 you gave up the shop?

A. 1918. I could not sell anything after Mallin, it was the first time they blew in the shop and smashed it into atoms.

7th Period:

Q. Were you actually in an engagement with the Tans and R.I.C., at Louisburgh?

A. Yes. That was in 1921?

Q. The last three months before the Truce?

A. It would be in April to the best of my knowledge.

Q. What was this?

A. It was after I was mobilised for, we were going to have the attack on Louisburgh Barracks, we mobilised all the men in a place called Gullig Lodge, about 2 miles from Louisburgh. We were waiting for some men from Westport area to come, the police got wise and got back reinforcements. We were in there, well armed; it was called off, we had to go then. We lay in a place called Crosspatrick there all night for the enemy to come, we rattled at them. What did they do—they went around Leenane ~~way~~ way into Westport, took the other road. There were three roads they could go by. Nobody expected they would go but where we were.

Q. This was a planned ambush?
 A. Yes.

Q. Was there an actual fight in Louisburgh?
 A. No. Only myself I was the only one

Q. This is the occasion where you say you were held up?
 A. Yes.

Q. That would be in May 1921?

A. April I think it was to the best of my knowledge, it would be about April 1921.

A. We had a mobilisation to attack, it was after that.

Q. Then you volunteered to go on the column?

A. I would not be let go—I wanted to go the whole time, I was sent back, he could not do without me.

Q. What were you doing in the company area?

A. I was organising and getting provisions that was where the column used to fall back on my area I had to look after them in every shape and form, to see they got food.

Q. This time you were held up and got away was the only time you had to use your gun in the whole period?

A. That was the only time I used the gun, except in Clifden.

Q. That is later on.

8th Period:

Q. Did you go into camp?

A. Yes. Camp and Barracks.

Q. Did you spend much time in barracks? What camps were you in?

A. Ballycroy.

Q. How long were you there?

A. A fortnight.

Q. Being trained? A company officer's camp?

A. Yes.

Q. Was that the only camp?

A. That was the only camp we were in, and the barracks in Louisburgh barracks, then in Castlebar.

Q. Was that during the Truce?

A. Yes.

Q. After camps you went home again?

A. I never went home.

Q. What were you doing in the Truce as regards volunteer work?

A. We were in the barracks.

Q. When The barracks were taken over as soon as that?

A. They were taken over after the Truce. It was early after the Truce I think. It was not very long after the Truce when the bks., were taken over.

A. Newport Barracks was evacuated early, I do not know about Louisburgh and Castlebar, generally the barrack were not taken over until February 1922, in some areas the police were withdrawn to the central town?

A. I think they were taken over before that, the police left Louisburgh before that, they left shortly after the Truce..

Q. You went into Louisburgh Barracks first?

A. Yes.

Q. How long did you stay there?

A. About 6 months.

Q. How long in Castlebar?

A. I was back and forth in Castlebar they sent me in then some of the men, I would come back.

Q. Was it a military barracks in Castlebar?
A. Yes.

Q. They did not get them until February 1922?
A. I think it would be something about that.

9th Period:

Q. Where were you when the Civil War broke out? How long in Castlebar barracks altogether?
A. Until the day they evacuated.

Q. You did not go in when they took them over in February?
A. I did, and stopped in it until the Civil War broke out.

Q. You spent 14 days in Ballycroy, 6 months in Louisburgh ~~Bks.~~, Police station then you went into Castlebar and stayed there for a further period of 4 or 5 months until the Civil War broke out?
A. Yes.

Q. You were in Castlebar when the Civil War broke out?
A. Yes. Attack on the Four Courts?

Q. Yes.
A. Yes. Then we went to Clifden and took Clifden Bks., off the enemy.

Q. Were you in the fight at Clifden?
A. Yes. I was in the fight in Clifden with my rifle.

Q. Any other fights?
A. No. That was the only fight I had. I had a little skirmish with the Free State Troops in Louisburgh.

Q. This is when you escaped from them?
A. Yes.

Q. Did they attempt to arrest you or what?
A. Yes.

Q. Were you armed?
A. I was of course.

Did you fire on them?
A. I did.

Q. You got away?
A. I got away.

Q. What had you?
A. The same rifle. ~~key~~ If they got me that time I knew it was either one way or the other.

Q. Did you get any of them?
A. I did not.

Q. What kind of position was it, you were in a house in the town?
A. In a house, they surrounded the house, I climbed a wall I got through the gardens at night, they surrounded the place I got

A. I got away through the gardens got under cover got over across the other side.

Q. Did you fire on them?
A. I did.

Q. Did they follow you?

A. They followed me as far as they could find me, one of them I heard got courtmartialled for not getting me. Their idea if they got me at any period—I was no more.

Q. Were you able to go back to your own area?
A. Yes.

Q. Helping in the transport of men and munitions?
A. Yes.

Q. Were you getting any provisions for them?

A. Yes. I was trying to get provisions at all times and making dugouts.

Q. Were you told to do this work definitely?

A. I was by Mr. Ned Mohan, Officer in command, brigadier and Paddy Kelly too.

Q. Did they instruct you to get back to the company area again and do the local work that was necessary to help the column?

A. To help the column to help the brigade staff and all.

Q. Was it Mohan told you do this?

A. Mohan, Paddy Kelly and Tom Heaney was adjutant.

Q. You helped to make dugouts and everything?

APPENDIX.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

RULES FOR DETERMINING NOTIONAL GRADES OF RANK IN THE FORCES HELD BY PERSONS SERVING IN THE FORCES.

1.—(1) Any person who at any date was either Chief of Staff, Deputy Chief of Staff, Adjutant General, a Divisional Officer Commanding, or Quartermaster General shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank A.

(2) Any person who at any date was either—

- (a) a General Headquarters Officer acting as Director of any one of the following services, namely Organisation, Intelligence, Engineering and Munitions, or
- (b) a Brigade Officer Commanding whose brigade was at that date not less than one thousand in strength,

shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank B.

(3) Any person who at any date was either—

- (a) a Brigade Officer Commanding whose brigade at that date was less than one thousand in strength, or
- (b) a Divisional Vice Officer Commanding, or
- (c) a Divisional Adjutant, or
- (d) a Divisional Quartermaster, or
- (e) a Battalion Commandant whose battalion was at that date not less than three hundred in strength, or
- (f) a Brigade Vice Officer Commanding whose brigade was at that date not less than one thousand in strength, or
- (g) a Brigade Adjutant whose brigade was at that date not less than one thousand in strength, or
- (h) a Brigade Quartermaster whose brigade was at that date not less than one thousand in strength, or
- (i) a Column Commander whose column was at that date not less than thirty in strength, or
- (j) a General Headquarters Officer who at that date was acting as Director of Medical Services, or
- (k) a General Headquarters Officer who at that date was acting as Director of any Service, other than that of Medical Services, or one of the Services mentioned in sub-paragraph (a) of the immediately preceding paragraph,

shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank C.

(4) A person who at any date—

- (a) was a Battalion Commandant whose battalion at that date was less than three hundred in strength, or
- (b) was a Company Captain whose company at that date was not less than sixty in strength, or
- (c) was, at that date, a Captain on the General Headquarters Staff or on a Divisional Staff, or
- (d) was, in the case of a company which at that date was not less than one hundred and twenty in strength, where the company had at that date one Lieutenant only, such Lieutenant or, where the company had at that date two Lieutenants only, one or other of such Lieutenants, or, where the company had at that date three or more Lieutenants, one or other of the two Lieutenants who were at that date respectively second and third in command, or
- (e) was, in the case of a company which at that date was less than one hundred and twenty in strength but not less than one hundred in strength, where such company had at that date one Lieutenant only, such Lieutenant or where such company had at that date two or more Lieutenants, the Lieutenant who was at that date second in command, or
- (f) was a Brigade Officer, other than a Brigade Officer who is deemed by virtue of paragraph (2) or (3) of this Rule to have held at that date either Rank B or Rank C, or
- (g) was a Battalion Vice Officer Commanding whose battalion at that date was not less than one hundred in strength, or
- (h) was a Battalion Adjutant whose battalion was at that date not less than one hundred in strength, or
- (i) was a Battalion Quartermaster whose battalion was at that date not less than one hundred in strength, or

- (j) was a General Headquarters Officer other than a General Headquarters Officer who was at that date acting as a Director of any Service, or
- (k) was a Divisional Officer other than a Divisional Officer Commanding, a Divisional Vice Officer Commanding, a Divisional Adjutant or a Divisional Quartermaster, or
- (l) was a Column Commander whose column at that date was less than thirty in strength, or
- (m) was a Medical Officer other than a General Headquarters Officer who at that date was acting as Director of Medical Services,

shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank D.

(5) Any person who complies with the following conditions, namely:—

- (a) was at any date an officer, and
- (b) is not deemed by virtue of any of the preceding paragraphs of this Rule to have held at that date any grade of rank,

shall be deemed for the purposes of this Act to have held at that date Rank E.

(6) Any person who at any date held the rank of non-commissioned officer or private shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank E.

(7) None of the foregoing provisions of this Rule shall apply to any person who at any date was a member of Fianna Eireann or of Cumann na mBan and was not at any date a member of Oglalaigh na hEireann (Irish Republican Army) or of the Irish Volunteers, and in lieu thereof the following provisions shall have effect in relation to any such person, that is to say:—

(a) any person who at any date:—

- (i) was a member of the headquarters staff or executive of Fianna Eireann or Cumann na mBan, or
- (ii) was an officer of Fianna Eireann or Cumann na mBan commanding one hundred members or more of either of those bodies, or
- (iii) was an officer of Fianna Eireann or Cumann na mBan senior to an officer of either of those bodies commanding one hundred members or more of either of those bodies,

shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank D, and

(b) any person who at any date was a member of Fianna Eireann or Cumann na mBan and who is not deemed by virtue of the foregoing sub-paragraph (a) of this paragraph to have held Rank D, shall be deemed to have held at that date Rank E.

2. Where an officer whose grade of rank at any date is, under Rule I of this Schedule, to be determined both by his actual rank in the Forces and the strength of the unit to which he belonged at that date, and such officer is, at that date, absent from duty by reason of imprisonment on account of his activities as a member of the Forces, the following provisions shall, for the purposes of the said Rule I, have effect in relation to such officer, that is to say:—

- (a) such officer shall be deemed to have held at that date the actual rank in the Forces which he held at the date of his arrest, and
- (b) such unit shall be deemed to be at that date at the same strength as it was at the time of his arrest.

3. Where the case of any person does not fall within the provisions of Rule I of this Schedule, the Referee may determine the particular grade of rank which such person is to be deemed to have held on any date, and in so determining the Referee shall have regard to the following matters, that is to say:—

- (a) the appointment held by such person,
- (b) the services performed by such person,
- (c) the principles of grading set forth in the said Rule I.

4. Where any person, whose case at a particular date falls within the provisions of Rule I of this Schedule, was, at that date, engaged in service of a special character, the Referee may, in making his report under this Act in relation to the grade of rank held by such person on such date, report that the grade of rank held by him on such date is a grade of rank higher than the grade which, but for this Rule, would be the grade of rank held by him on that date.

DEFINITION OF THE FIRST AND SECOND CRITICAL DATES.

1. In the case of a person who served in the Forces during the period commencing on the 1st day of July, 1922, and ending on the 30th day of September, 1923,

The expression "the first critical date" means the 11th day of July, 1921; and the expression "the second critical date" means:—

(a) in the case of a person who served in the Forces on the 1st day of July, 1922, the 1st day of July, 1922 and

(b) in the case of a person who did not serve in the Forces on the 1st day of July, 1922, but who served in the Forces at any time during the period commencing on the 2nd day of July, 1922, and ending on the 30th day of September, 1923, the date during that period on which such person first served in the Forces.


2. In the case of a person who did not serve in the Forces during the period commencing on the 1st day of July, 1922, and ending on the 30th day of September, 1923, but who has either:—

(a) served in the Forces at any time during the week commencing on the 23rd day of April, 1916, or

(b) served in the Forces continuously during the period commencing on the 1st day of April, 1921, and ending on the 11th day of July, 1921,

the expression "the first critical date" shall be construed as meaning the date during the said week, or if he did not serve during the said week, during the said period, on which he first served in the Forces in such week or such period (as the case may be), and

the expression "the second critical date" shall be construed as meaning the earliest date in the period between the first critical date in respect of such person, and the 12th day of July, 1921, on which such person held his highest rank in such last-mentioned period in the Forces.



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
