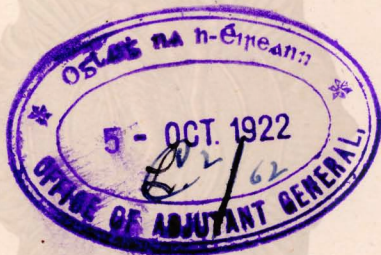

shot at the Tower, Howth, on the 22nd

On the 23rd instant an inquest was held on deceased at
Howth.

Evidence was given that on the night of the 22nd instant,
the deceased was challenged four times by the sentry at the Tower
to which he did not respond, and was fired on. The following verdict
was returned "Deceased Private William Warren 4th bat. regulars did
as a result of a bullet wound inflicted by a National Soldier in
discharge of his duty.

Inquest held on Private John O'Malley found
dead in lavatory at Portobello Barracks on
the 21st instant about 12-30 p.m.

The Secretary,
Ministry of Home Affairs.

On the 22nd an Inquest was held on deceased at Portobello Barracks. Evidence was given of the deceased having been found dead in the lavatory, that he was in his usual state of health beforehand and medical evidence as to the cause of death. The jury returned the following verdict. "Death was due to cerebral hemorrhage and they wished to convey their sympathy to the relatives of the deceased and to recommend family to the consideration of the Army Authorities.
