The Applicant requests respectively that this her application for a substantial allowance or grant be addeded to in the following circumstances showing her dependency on the Deceased and the great loss she has suffered by his death.

The Applicant's Husband the late Mr. John George Lidwell was a Solicitor practising at 33, Upper Ormond Quay in the City of Dublin and he died in July 1919 leaving the Applicant and the following children him surviving. Mabel (Over 21 years of age) the Deceased Frederick, Sheila, and Doreen. Sheila has since married, but Doreen is still a child of tender years. The Deceased J.G. Lidwell died intestate leaving as his only assets the business carried on at 33, Upper Ormond Quay which turned out to be of no selling value. The Applicant and her family continued to live in the rented house occupied by them at 6, Corrig Avenue DunLaoghaire and an arrangement was made whereby the said business was taken over by another Solicitor Mr. Phillip O'Reilly on the basis of a division of profitsout of the business which would continue to be carried on and from this source the Applicant is at present in receipt of an Income worth 35/- per week part of said arrangement was that the Deceased Frederick who was an apprentice to his late father should continue his apprenticeship with Mr. O'Reilly and upon

becoming qualified as a Solicitor would carry on business

in Partnership with Mr. O'Reilly. Owing to insufficiency of means (due to the debts of the late Mr. Lidwell the expenses of supporting and providing for her family and the payment of house rent it being found impossible to provide a cheaper house) Mrs Lidwell was forced to sell portion of her furniture and to take lodgers in her house in order to supplement her income. This state of things continued despite the fact that Sheila and Mabel married and left the place without so far being paid the shares to which they are entitled out of the Estate of their Deceased father. The real value of the said Arrangement was that the Deceased Frederick should qualify and practise as a Solicitor in which case he could provide or help to provide for the Applicant and the child Doreen.

The Deceased Frederick whilst a law student was attracted to the service of his Country and early in the movement participated in the General Elections of 1918 in support of the Sinn Fein Candidate for South Co. Dublin He was since then Member of the Sinn Fein Organization and in 1920 joined the I.R.A. and was attached Applicant in informed to an active Service Unit. He also acted as Registrar of the DunLaoghaire District Court at the same time he pursued his legal work and passed the Intermediate . Examination whilst reading for the final Examination he applied for a legal position in the National Army wind was appointed in this capacity to Kilkenny as Staff Captain at a salary of £400 per annum with allowances which sum was primarily to be devoted to supporting the Applicant his Mother and his Sister Doreen.

He took up duty at once and was at the same time candidate for the Final Examination and whilst on this duty he met his death. The death of the deat

The Applicant's circumstances at the time of his entering into said position were greatly straitned and are now of very extreme gravity the applicant had been carrying on her household under circumstances of great

difficulty barely managing with the Income derived from lodgers until such time as her said Son should qualify and meantime being assured of considerable financial assistance from him in the position he had attained and which it was expected he would attain for some time past. The Applicant and expecially the child Doreen were at the time of his death virtually totally dependent upon the salary which would accrue to the Deceased Son but none of which in fact became payable.

In all the circumstances she respectively submits to the kind consideration of the Irish Government Authorities whose loyal and devoted servant her son was at all times.
