I am directed by the Army Pensions Board to state that they have under consideration a claim for Allowance or Gratuity under the Army Pensions Act 1932 from Miss Mary Bagnal, 13, Kelvin Grove, Sydenham, London, S.E. 26, in respect of her deceased brother, Patrick Bagnal, a member of Oglai na h-Eireann, who was executed at the Curragh Military Prison on the 19th December 1922.

Miss Bagnal stated that her Parish Priest was Father O'Shea, Brockley Rise, London. Father O'Shea states, however, that he does not know her, that her address is not in his Parish and that consequently he cannot make any enquiries in the case. In reply to further enquiries as regards the extent of her dependency on the deceased and on being requested to furnish the name and address of some responsible person who can testify as to her statements, Miss Bagnal states that Mr. Doyle, Claregate Street, Kildare, is in a position to testify.

The Board will be obliged if you will cause discreet enquiries to be made by the Garda with a view to ascertaining applicant's degree of dependency (if any) on the deceased, and a report furnished on the attached form.

The home address of the deceased at the time of death appears to have been Fair Green, Kildare, and that of the applicant c/o Mr. J. Duane, Grey Abbey, Kildare.
